SC 769 (Congaree/Air Base Rd) over Cedar Creek experienced a double culvert collapse during the 2015 flood event.

The replacement bridge will be constructed with the following commitments:

- The pre-existing culvert will be replaced with a bridge on existing location
- The bridge will be the same length or longer than the pre-existing culvert.
- The bridge will be the same height or higher than the pre-existing culvert.
- USACE 404 Permit will be the responsibility of the SCDOT Environmental Services Office.
- A National Register listed property (Magnolia Plantation/Wavering Place) is located in the southeastern quadrant of the project. Although the nomination for the property only recognizes 3.3. acres of the property, SCDOT's cultural resource staff believes the entire parcel (R27600-00-02) would be eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. Any right of way acquisition from this property would therefore require a Section 4f evaluation. SCDOT's cultural resource staff believes the project would result in a no adverse effect determination and would be eligible for processing as a Section 4f de minimus evaluation. SCDOT will be responsible for all Section 106 coordination and completion of the Section 4f evaluation.

Two 10' x 12' culverts and a large portion of Congaree Road (SC Route 769) in Richland County were washed downstream during the 2015 flood event (see attached photos). The Department is in the process of developing a design-build project to correct the roadway as part of statewide emergency repair efforts. The design build contractor will be responsible for the design and construction of a new bridge structure and its approaches. The new bridge will be built on the essentially the same horizontal alignment. The vertical alignment of the roadway may increase slightly (no greater than 3-4' change in height) to meet current hydraulic design requirements. Some areas of new right-of-way acquisition may be required for construction access.

For the purposes of Section 106 review, a 800' x 200' study area was established for review of the direct effects of road construction and utility relocation. Viewshed impacts were assessed within a 300' buffer of the area for potential direct effects (see Figure 1). The majority of the study corridor for direct effects is located within existing wetlands or has been previously disturbed by road, railroad, and utility construction (see Figures 2 and 3). No archaeological investigations are needed to assess the direct effects of the undertaking.

One National Register-listed property (Magnolia/Wavering Place) is located approximately 1200' from the southern end of the project. The Magnolia/Wavering Place property was listed in 1986 at the state level of significance. According to the nomination, the 3.3-acre listed property includes a large two-story Greek Revival home constructed ca.' 1885. The grounds of the property include several antebellum outbuildings including a one-story brick building and three one-story, frame buildings representing a smokehouse and two slave houses.

Although the 3.3-acre listed property is located outside the area of potential visual effects, the Department's cultural resource staff believes the landscape surrounding the immediate grounds contributes to the property's historical significance. The current legal boundaries of the property encompass a 267-acre parcel surrounding the listed portion of the property. The current project is located at the far northwestern end of the property. The area



is low-lying and includes a large stand of trees between the project and the immediate grounds surrounding the main house. Any construction activity or minor takes of right-of-way from the eligible boundary of the property would **not** cause adverse effects to the historic property.

Per 36 CFR Part 800.5, the Department has determined that the proposed undertaking will have no adverse effect upon historic properties. Per the terms of the Section 106 Programmatic Agreement executed on August 18, 2014, the Department is providing this information on behalf of the Federal Highway Administration. It is requested that you review the enclosed material and, if appropriate, indicate your concurrence in the Department's findings. Please respond within 30 days if you have any objections or if you have need of additional information.










SC ROUTE 769 **EMERGENCY REPAIR AERIAL WITH CONTOURS**
