Oversize Overweight Permits	SECTION 57-3-130	Special permit to operate or move vehicle exceeding maximum size, weight or load or otherwise not in conformity with requirements; fee; discretion in issuing; conditions; security; annual permit; limited applicability of Title 1, Chapter 23	SCDOT charges special permit fees to operate or move vehicle exceeding maximum size, weight or load or otherwise not in conformity with requirements; fee; discretion in issuing; conditions; security; annual permit; limited applicability of Title 1, Chapter 23. Toll Violations	SECTION 57-5-1490	Penalty for failure to pay toll	Any person who uses the Cross Island Parkway and fails or refuses to pay the toll provided therefore shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than two hundred dollars or by imprisonment for not more than thirty days, and in addition thereto the Department shall have a lien upon the vehicle driven by such person for the amount of such toll and may take and retain possession thereof. Toll Violations- Administrative Fee	SECTION 57-5-1495	Tolls - Administrative fees	The department or its authorized agent may assess and collect administrative fees of: (1) not more than ten dollars for the first toll violation within a period of one year; (2) not more than twenty-five dollars for each subsequent toll violation within a period of one year. These funds are used to support toll operations collections activities.	\$ 148,148
