STATEMENT OF POLICY

Policy No. 1

Subject: **Dedicating a road, bridge or highway facility**

References: **Section 57-3-610, S. C. Code of Laws, 1976, as amended**

The South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) Commission establishes the following policy for dedicating roads, bridges or highway facilities in honor of an individual or individuals:

- 1) By General Assembly action - No additional vote or action by the Commission is necessary when the General Assembly dedicates a road, bridge or other highway facility in honor of an individual or individuals by Concurrent Resolution. Upon receipt from the General Assembly of an official copy of the act or concurrent resolution and written approval for reimbursement of the expenses of the dedication from "C" funds as provided by S. C. Code Section 57-3-610, the Secretary of Transportation shall take appropriate action to erect proper signage.
- 2) By Commission – The Commission may by majority vote dedicate a road, bridge or other highway facility in honor of an individual or individuals. The entity requesting the dedication must reimburse the expenses incurred by SCDOT for the dedication. Upon Commission action to approve the dedication and receipt of a written reimbursement agreement from the requesting entity, the Secretary of Transportation shall take appropriate action to erect proper signage.

Policy No. **1**

Subject: **Naming or dedicating a road, bridge or highway facility**

References: **Section 57-3-610, S. C. Code of Laws, 1976, as amended**

The South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) Commission establishes the following policy for naming or dedicating roads, bridges or highway facilities in honor of an individual or individuals:

- 1) By General Assembly action - No additional vote or action by the Commission is necessary when the General Assembly names or dedicates a road, bridge or other highway facility in honor of an individual or individuals. Upon receipt from the General Assembly of an official copy of the act or resolution and written approval for reimbursement of the expenses of the dedication from "C" funds as provided by S. C. Code Section 57-3-610, the Secretary of Transportation shall take appropriate action to erect proper signage.
- 2) By Commission – The Commission may by majority vote to name or dedicate a road, bridge or other highway facility in honor of an individual or individual an SCDOT official or employee who loses his or her life in the line of duty or provided exceptional service to the agency. In such cases, SCDOT will bear the expense of any dedication ceremony and the cost to prepare and install appropriate signage. The entity requesting the dedication must reimburse the expenses incurred by SCDOT for the dedication. Upon Commission action to approve the naming or dedication and receipt of a written reimbursement agreement from the requesting entity, the Secretary of Transportation shall take appropriate action to erect proper signage.

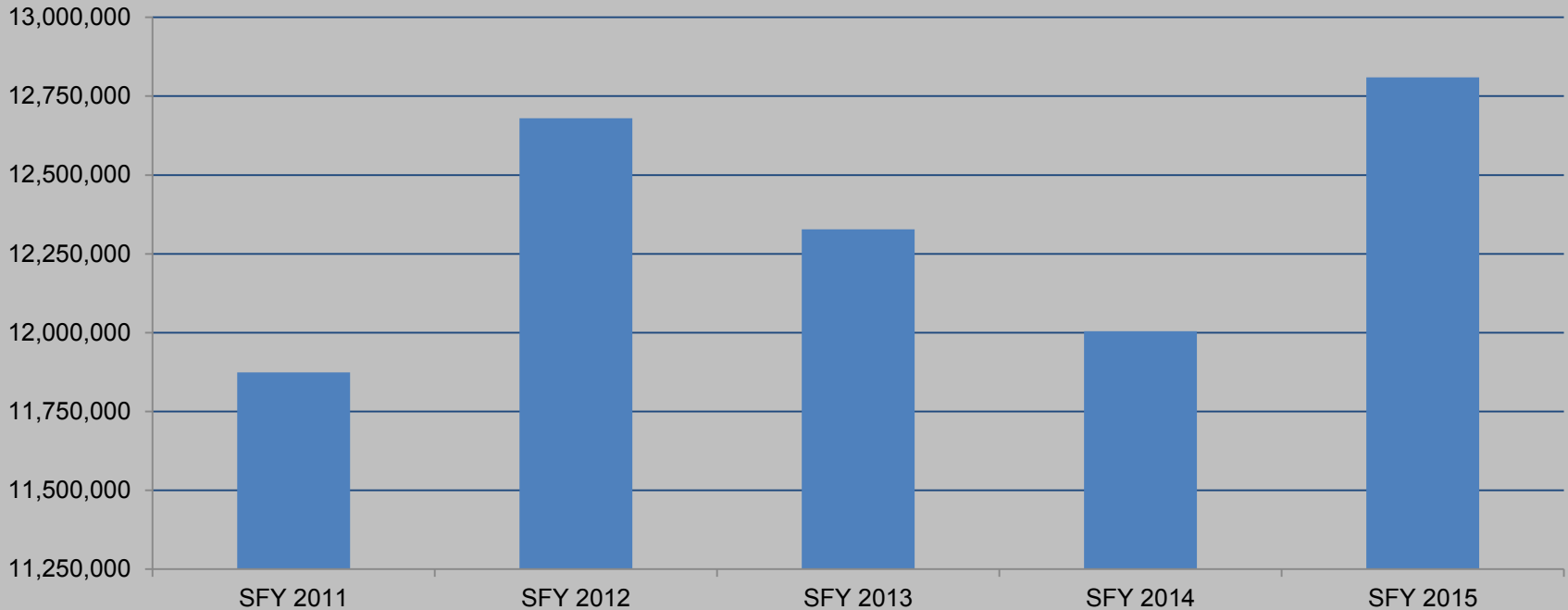

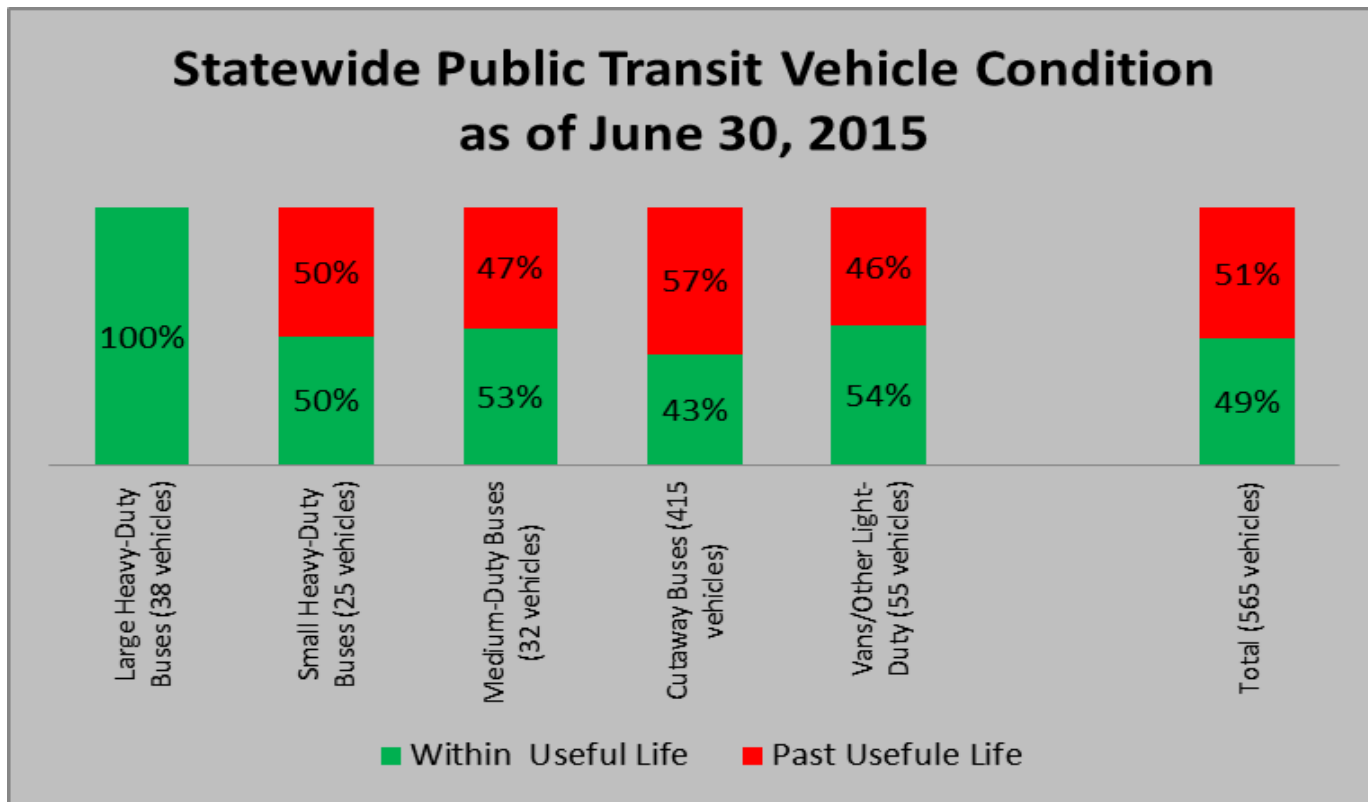


Public Transit Efficiency

Statewide Public Transit Cost Per Passenger Trip



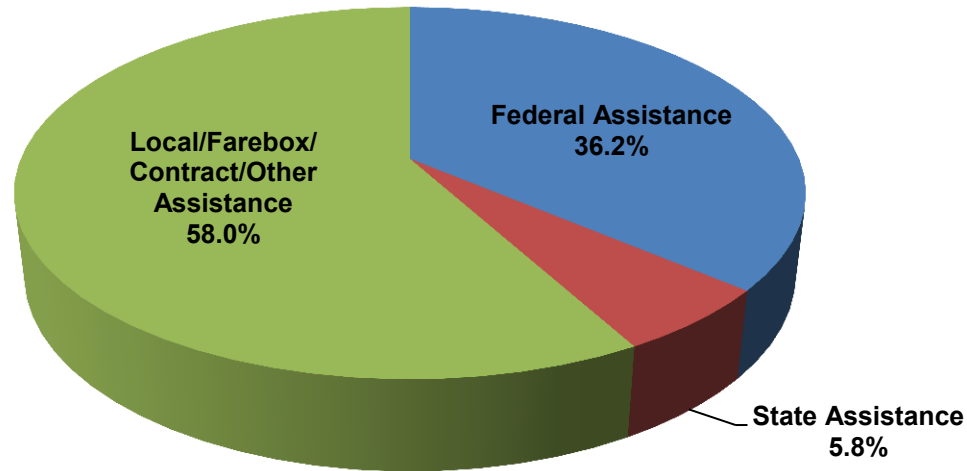

Public Transit Revenue Sources

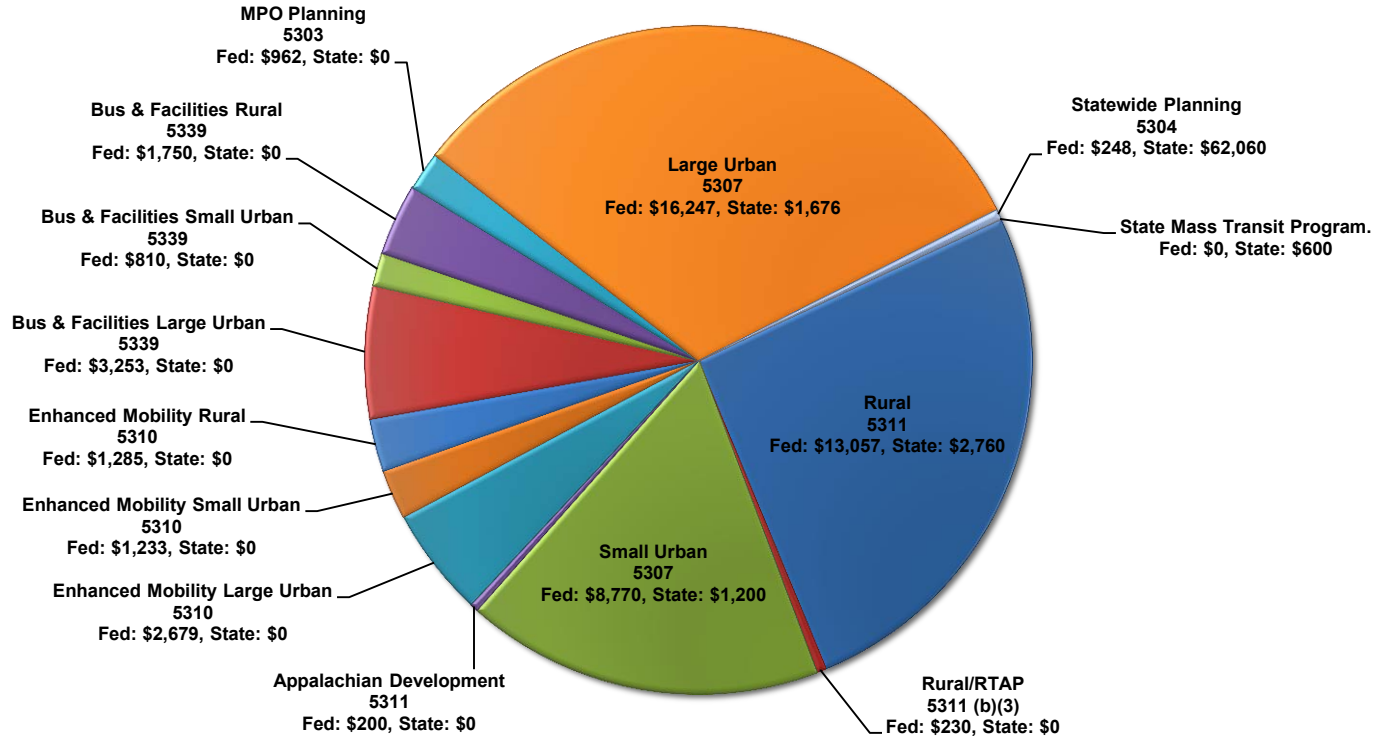
Total 2014-2015 Statewide Public Transit Revenue



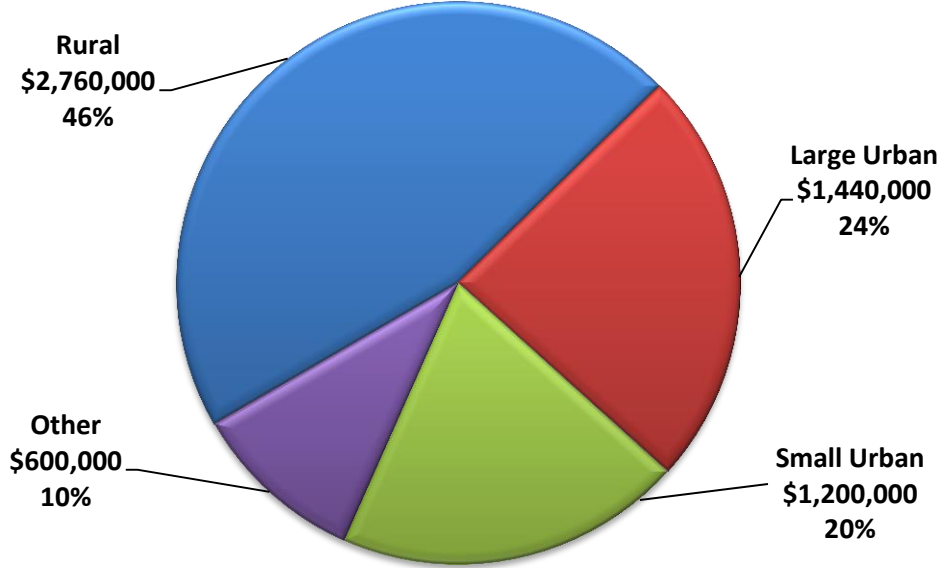
Proposed FFY2016 Public Transit Funding Plan

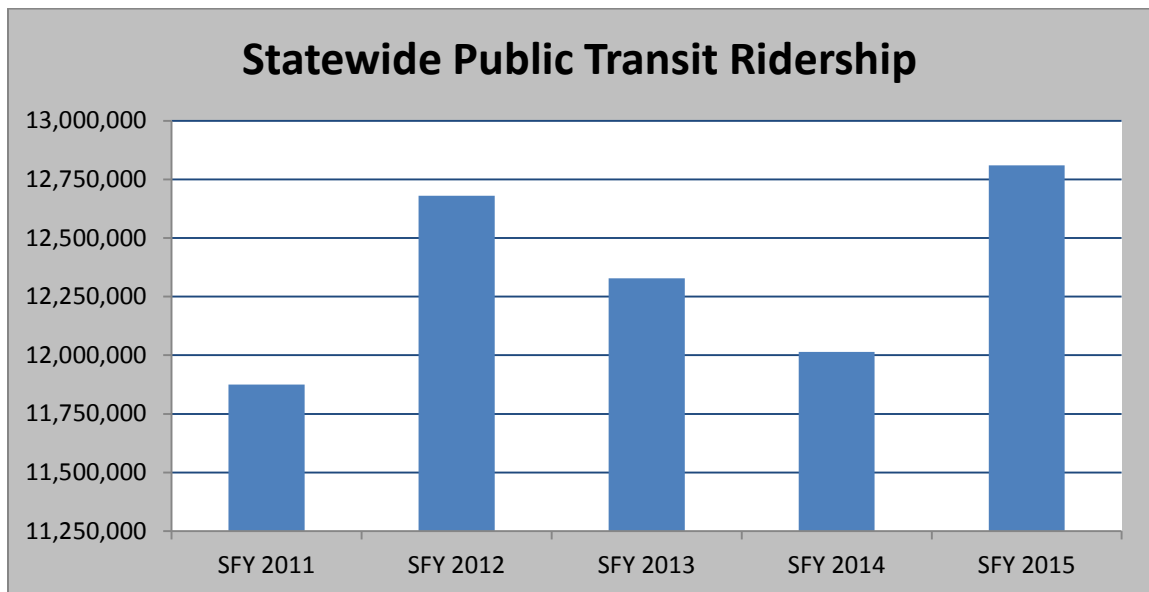

YEAR IN REVIEW

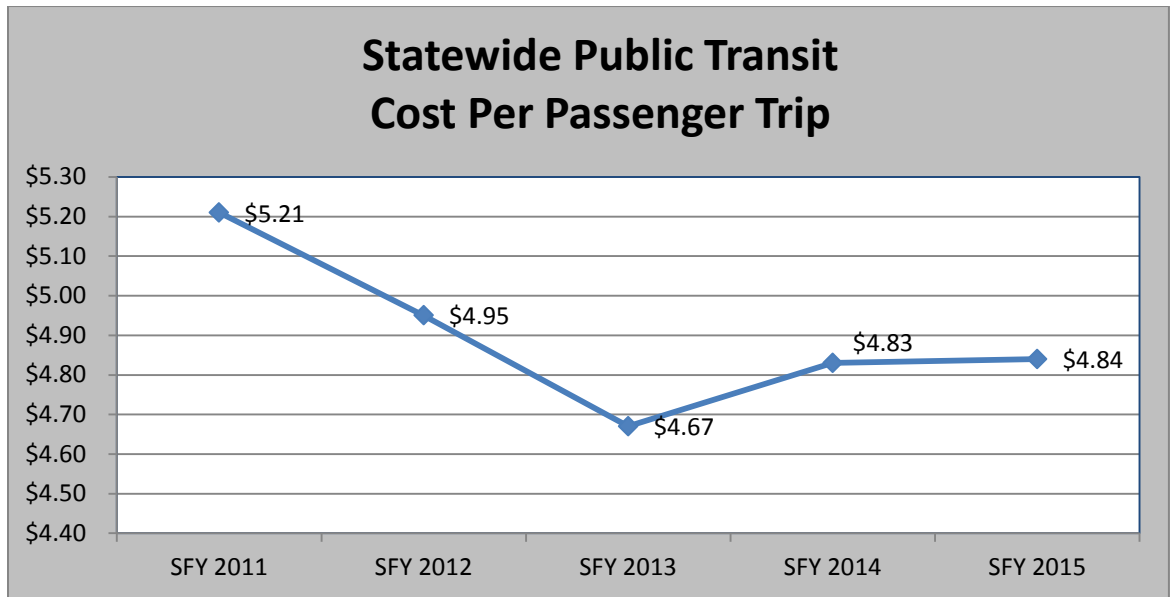
Public transit is a core component of South Carolina’s multimodal transportation network. Establishing, financing, and sustaining effective, statewide, publicly-operated transit service in urban and rural areas continues to be a major challenge, while at the same time one of our biggest accomplishments.

Below are a few highlights from 2015:

- The Office of the State Auditor conducted an annual audit of the Office of Public Transit (OPT) in August 2015, during which no findings were issued. This continues the multi-year trend of federal, state and internal audits and reviews in which SCDOT’s OPT has had no audit findings at any level. The Office of Public Transit also met its internal goal of completing on-site reviews of eight public transit agencies, providing opportunity for sub-recipient agencies to receive technical assistance, while ensuring compliance with federal and state regulations. These reviews also assess the financial, managerial and technical capacities of the agencies.
- During State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2015, over 12 million passenger trips were provided for the third year in a row, including record ridership of 12.8 million in SFY 2015. This represents a 6.6% increase over SFY 2014, and the five-year trend analysis shows an 8% increase in transit ridership since SFY 2011. Average operating costs of \$4.84 per passenger trip represents a minimal 0.2% increase over SFY2014, while the five-year trend analysis shows a 7.1% decrease in average operating cost per passenger trip since SFY 2011, indicative of overall enhanced efficiencies.



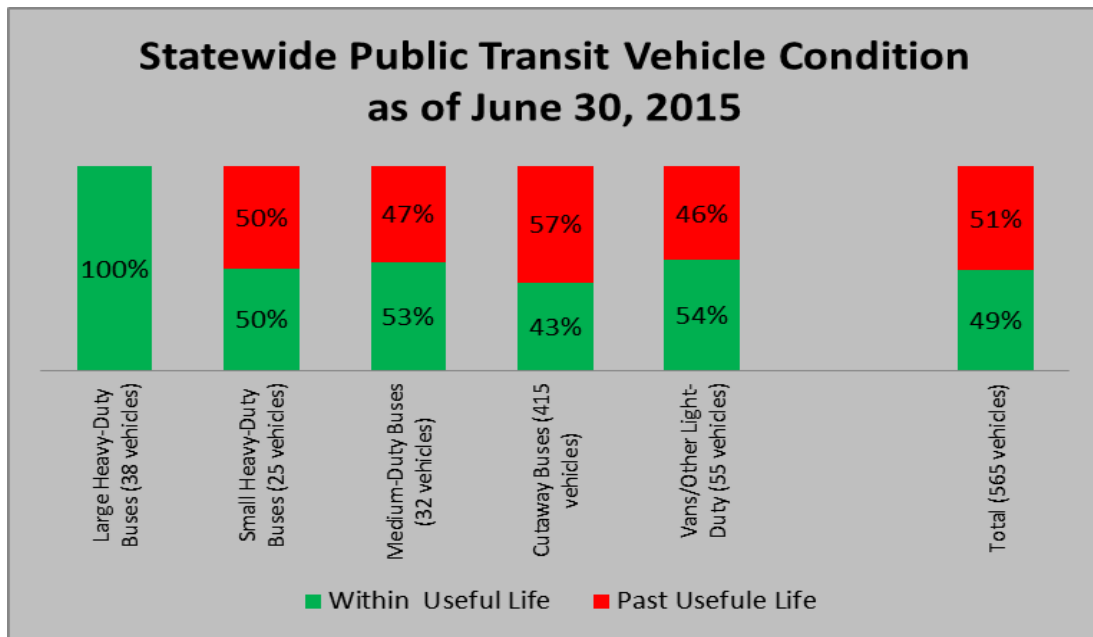

- OPT continues to increase efficiency and customer service while reducing administrative burdens for SCDOT and local and regional transit agencies through automation of some of our processes. OPT developed and implemented a Transit Asset Management and Information System (TAMIS) with the following core components:
 - Transit Asset Management System to track and monitor transit asset conditions and optimize replacement of public transit vehicles;
 - Grants Management System that will allow local transit agency submittal of funding applications and management of their projects online, and electronic SCDOT award and oversight of subrecipient contracts and projects;
 - VTE-Form – (Virtual Transit Enterprise) an electronic invoicing system that has replaced the former paper-based invoicing system for our local transit partners;
 - Performance Management System that will allow for ongoing review and assessment of individual and statewide transit performance and enhanced reporting of statewide transit performance through our public website.

- SCDOT implemented a Statewide Transit Vehicle Replacement Program based on the results of the Statewide Vehicle Utilization Review and Assessment completed in March 2015. This assessment determined transit agencies’ actual asset needs based on optimized service levels, and we were able to identify limited federal funding through an innovative initiative that allows us to fully match carry-forward Federal formula funding that was unable to be drawn down due to lack of local match. OPT is maximizing the use of this program with a capital asset replacement plan that is projected to significantly reduce the number of current SCDOT-titled public transit vehicles past their useful life.

- Over the past year SCDOT has continued innovative initiatives and modified existing programs that were aimed at lessening the impact of fiscal difficulties many transit providers were facing. OPT continued efforts with a number of public transit agencies to develop Financial Recovery and Sustainability Plans. In doing so, our state’s public transit providers have become more fiscally sustainable, addressed budget shortfalls while new fiscal management processes were implemented, and maximized the drawdown of available federal transit funding.
- OPT continued the Technical Assistance and Oversight Program with all public transit agencies in the state to ensure that the scope and associated costs of transit services are commensurate with available and projected revenues. This has resulted in an ongoing “right-sizing” of transit services statewide to better ensure long-term fiscal sustainability, which benefits ridership through increased efficiencies.
- SCDOT led an effort, through the SC Interagency Transportation Coordination Council, that resulted in completion of an interagency Human Services Transportation Infrastructure Review that identifies a model for more effective and cost-efficient transportation coordination for SC. The ultimate goal of this effort is to reduce overall public and human services transportation costs in a manner that maintains or enhances the delivery of transit services across agencies, while reducing the fiscal impact to the state as a whole.

- Within existing resource limitations, SCDOT committed to and provided program and administrative planning support for statewide regional coordination activities through each Council of Governments, with an emphasis on enhancing regional transit coordination effectiveness, efficiency and local communication of public transit goals, objectives and initiatives.
- Under the auspices of the SCDOT Statewide Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) Architecture Plan update (February 2015), OPT worked with the offices of Procurement, Information Technology and Traffic Engineering to assess current technology utilized by public transit providers, and was able to identify gaps and opportunities for improving technology placement to support the traveling public's information needs and enhance transit agencies' day-to-day operational effectiveness.

SCDOT has continued increasing efficiency and customer service while reducing administrative burdens for the Office of Public Transit as well as local and regional transit agencies. SCDOT continues to work with all of our transit stakeholders in achieving the transit-focused strategies outlined in SCDOT's Strategic Plan, and the overall vision "to deliver, operate and maintain a world-class, 21st century, multimodal transportation system that enables the Palmetto State to continue to grow its economy, enhance communities, and improve the environment."

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Public transit service meets a variety of needs in South Carolina, including those of commuting workers, students, shoppers and medical patients. At least one transit agency operates in each of the ten planning regions in the state. Commuter transit service has been used in some communities to address high unemployment and the lack of local job opportunities. The rural characteristics of many South Carolina communities make the provision of transit service more of a challenge as compared to urban communities where there are generally higher population densities. Transit services have been implemented in some communities through existing human service agencies that have agreed to provide general public transportation service in addition to their human service transportation activities. This report represents the results of Operating Statistics (OPSTATS) data analyzed based on submissions from transit operators statewide.

TRANSIT OPERATIONS DURING FY 2015

During State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2015 (July 1, 2014 – June 30, 2015), there were 27 public transit operations that were supported by funding managed by the SCDOT Office of Public Transit. Among these transit operations were agencies that provided services in small towns, counties, urbanized service areas, and multiple-county regions of the State. The type of service area is important since there are specific funding programs established for transit services operated in rural or urbanized communities. The following chart shows transit operations breakout by urbanized and non-urbanized or rural service areas:

During SFY 2015, general public transit services were available in 40 of the 46 counties in the State. Counties without established general public transit service were Abbeville, Cherokee, Greenwood, Laurens, Saluda and Union Counties. In 2015, transit agencies employed a total of 728 transit vehicles (565 DOT-Titled vehicles, plus 163 Agency-Owned) in delivering a variety of service types to residents and visitors in South Carolina.

TRANSIT SERVICE TO CUSTOMERS DURING SFY 2015

The 27 general public transit operations collectively provided a total of 12,809,230 individual passenger trips during SFY2015. This figure represents a 6.6% increase in transit ridership delivered in comparison to the SFY 2014 ridership level of 12,013,668. The SFY2015 ridership figure also represents a 3.9% increase over the number of passenger trips reported for 2013 of 12,327,696. The transit agencies operating in urbanized service areas have generally delivered greater numbers of passenger trips than those operating in rural communities. This observation is borne out by the SFY2015 transit data for South Carolina, as the urban transit providers delivered 10,823,338 passenger trips (84%) in comparison to 1,985,892 trips (16%) delivered by rural transit agencies.

PUBLIC TRANSIT OPERATING REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES

Total public transit operating revenues for SFY 2015 were \$67,021,453. Urbanized service area agencies accounted for a greater share of this total at \$48,043,216. The rural agencies had a collective total of \$18,978,237 for SFY2015. The total revenue reported for SFY2015 represented a 1.2% decrease over the total revenue reported for SFY2014 and 13.7% increase over the total revenue reported for SFY2013.

Total public transit operating expenditures for SFY2014 were \$62,041,253. Urbanized service area agencies reported expenditures totaling \$43,179,373 while the rural agencies reported expenditures totaling \$18,861,880. The total expenditures reported for SFY 2015 represented a 6.8% increase over the total expenditures reported for SFY2014 and 7.7% increase from the expenditures reported for FY2013.

PUBLIC TRANSIT OPERATING PERFORMANCE MEASURES

The Office of Public Transit looks at 9 types of performance measures in the Transit Trends report: Cost per Passenger Trip, Cost per Vehicle Mile, Cost per Vehicle Revenue Mile, Cost per Vehicle Hour, Cost per Vehicle Revenue Hour, Passenger Trips per Vehicle Revenue Mile, Passenger Trips per Vehicle Revenue Hour, Farebox recovery ratio and Contract recovery ratio. Of these, this summary highlights five: Cost per Passenger Trip, Cost per Revenue Mile, Passenger Trips per Vehicle Revenue Mile, Farebox Recovery ratio and Contract Recovery Ratio.

- Cost per Passenger Trip is calculated by dividing the reported operating expenditure amount by the total number of reported Passenger Trips. Passenger Trips (also referred to as Unlinked Passenger Trips) are defined by the National Transit Database as “. . . the number of passengers who board public transportation vehicles. Passengers are counted each time they board vehicles no matter how many vehicles they use to travel from their origin to their destination.” Statewide, in SFY2015, the cost per passenger trip was

\$4.84. This figure represents a 0.2% increase over the reported cost from SFY2014 and a 3.6% increase from the cost reported for SFY2013.

- Cost per Revenue Mile is calculated by dividing the total operating expenditures by the total vehicle revenue miles. For SFY2015, the statewide cost per revenue mile was \$3.24, an increase of 0.9% over SFY2014 and an increase of 8.7% over SFY2013.
- Passenger Trips per Vehicle Revenue Mile are calculated by dividing the reported number of passenger trips by the reported number of vehicle revenue miles. Statewide, in SFY2015, the number of passenger trips per revenue vehicle mile was 0.67. This represents an increase of 1.5% from SFY2014 and a 4.7% increase over SFY2013.
- Farebox recovery ratio is one of two performance measure which indicates the degree to which a public transit operation is generating passenger-related revenue to cover operating costs. The farebox recovery ratio is calculated by dividing all fares revenues by the total operating expenditures for the same period of time. Placed in percent form, the farebox recovery ratio shows the portion of operating expenses that could be covered by collected fares. Prior to SFY2014 expense recovery through farebox and contract revenue sources was combined. Since SFY2014, the farebox and contract revenue sources are treated independently. In SFY2015, urban agencies statewide covered 18.4% of their operating expenses utilizing fares. This percentage was down from the 18.9% farebox revenue seen in SFY2014 and from the 27.2% (farebox and contract revenues) seen in SFY2013. Statewide, rural agencies were able to cover 7.9% of their operating expenses utilizing fares. This percentage was also down from the 8.4% farebox revenue seen in SFY2014 and from the 43.9% (farebox and contract revenues) seen in SFY2013.
- Contract recovery ratio is the second performance measure which indicates the degree to which a public transit operation is generating passenger-related revenue to cover operating costs. The contract recovery ratio is calculated by dividing all passenger contract revenue, by the total operating expenditures for the same period of time. Placed in percent form, the contract recovery ratio shows the portion of operating expenses that are covered by contract revenue. In SFY2015, overall, contract revenues accounted for 12.4% of statewide operating expenses for both urban and rural transit providers. Urban agencies statewide covered 5.4% of their operating expenses utilizing contract revenue. Rural agencies statewide were able to cover 30.2% of their operating expenses utilizing contract revenue. Statewide, for FY 2015, Medicaid revenue represented 64% of the revenue received from contracts. In the urbanized areas, Medicaid revenue represented 36.5% of the revenue received from contracts and 76.6% of the revenue received from contracts in the non-urbanized areas.

Berkeley County – File 8.3001 – Road S-139 (Campbell Street) – First District

The Department acquired right of way for this portion of Road S-139 (Campbell Street) by Legislative Act 827 of 1948 and action of the Commission dated September 21, 1950.

Upon a request from Campbell Howard, LLC in the City of Hanahan, County of Berkeley, approval was obtained from the South Carolina Department of Transportation Commission for both the formal removal of a portion of Road S-139 (Campbell Street) from the State Highway System and for conveying the right of way of same on February 18, 2016. Therefore, a gratis quitclaim deed conveying approximately 0.02 of a mile of road right of way to Campbell Howard, LLC was executed on March 28, 2016.

Edgefield County – File 19.127B.1 – US Route 25 – Third District

The Department acquired right of way for US Route 25 under Project Number 21 Reop & 230-B Reop. by Condemnation from Metropolitan Life Insurance Company dated May 1, 1930.

To resolve a dispute during relocation and realignment of US Route 25, an agreement was made whereby SCDOT would deed a portion of old US Route 25 to the adjacent landowner. The parcel of land was circulated to the engineering sections and determined to be surplus by the Department. Commission approval to convey the property was obtained on March 19, 2015, and a letter was received from Edgefield County declining any interest in the old roadbed. Therefore, a gratis quitclaim deed conveying approximately 3.19 acres of land to Alvin B. Bryan, Jr. and Cynthia E. Bryan, as joint tenants with right of survivorship was executed on March 28, 2016.

Edgefield County – File 19.127B.1 – US Route 25 – Third District

The Department acquired right of way for US Route 25 under Project Number 21 Reop & 230-B Reop. by Condemnation from Metropolitan Life Insurance Company dated May 1, 1930.

To resolve a dispute during relocation and realignment of US Route 25, an agreement was made whereby SCDOT would deed a portion of old US Route 25 to Alvin B. Bryan, Jr. and Cynthia E. Bryan. In order to negate any further issues, SCDOT also agreed to deed the remaining portion of the old road location to additional landowners. The parcel of land was circulated to the engineering sections and determined to be surplus by the Department. Commission approval to convey the property was obtained on March 19, 2015, and a letter was received from Edgefield County declining any interest in the old roadbed. Therefore, a gratis quitclaim deed conveying approximately 2.6 acres of land to Merry Land Clay Land, LLC was executed on April 14, 2016.

Greenville County – File 23.304A – Road S-107 (Mauldin Road) – Fourth District

The Department acquired right of way for Road S-30 (now S-170) under File 23.359 from E. M. and Rosa Lee Bishop by Deed to Right of Way dated April 30, 1954, and from W. B. Scoggins by Condemnation dated May 13, 1954.

A request was received from the adjacent landowner, NAJAM, LLC, to acquire a portion of the abandoned portion of old Mauldin Road, due to its relocation and realignment. The engineering sections concurred with relinquishing the property. Commission approval to relinquish the property was acquired on October 15, 2015. Therefore, a quitclaim deed conveying approximately 0.21 of an acre of land to NAJAM, LLC was executed on April 12, 2016, for the consideration of \$30,000.00.

Horry County – File 26.381 – Road S-119 (16th Avenue North) – Seventh District

The Department acquired right of way for Road S-119 by Letter of Dedication from the City of Myrtle Beach dated September 29, 1959, and as a Beltline Act Addition pursuant to Legislative Act 145 of 1941, and action of the Commission dated May 18, 1950.

Upon a request from the City of Myrtle Beach in the County of Horry, approval was obtained from the South Carolina Department of Transportation Commission for both the formal removal of Road S-119 (16th Avenue North) from the State Highway System and for conveying the right of way of same on February 18, 2016. Therefore, a gratis quitclaim deed conveying approximately 0.34 of a mile of road right of way to the City of Myrtle Beach was executed on March 28, 2016.

Laurens County – File 30.437 - Road S-524 – Third District

The Department acquired right of way for Road S-524 under File 30.437 by Right of Way Easement from C.P. Ashley dated June 2, 1965.

Upon receiving a request from the adjacent landowner for a small parcel of land along Road S-524 due to a retaining wall encroachment, a parcel of land was circulated to the engineering sections and determined to be surplus by the Department. Commission approval to convey the property was obtained on January 21, 2016. Therefore, a quitclaim deed conveying approximately 114.5 square feet of land to Dennis A. Silvers was executed on March 28, 2016, for the consideration of \$250.00.

Laurens County – File 30.746 - Road S-40 – Third District

The Department acquired right of way for Road S-23 under File 30.259 by Deed to Right of Way from Raymond Robertson dated August 17, 1948, by Deed to Right of Way from R.H. Fleming dated August 16, 1948, and by Deed to Right of Way from Charles A. Robertson dated August 16, 1948; for Road S-40 under File 30.272 by Deed to Right of Way from R.H. Fleming dated October 24, 1949, and by Condemnation from Charles A. Robertson dated November 18, 1949;

and for Road S-23 under File 30.746 by Right of Way Easement from Raymond E. Robertson dated April 2, 1992.

Upon receiving a request from the adjacent landowner for a parcel of land at the intersection of Road S-40 and Road S-23 due to relocation and realignment of these two roads, a parcel of land was circulated to the engineering sections and determined to be surplus by the Department. Commission approval to convey the property was obtained on January 21, 2016. Therefore, a quitclaim deed conveying approximately 1.08 acres of land to Joel W. Bledsoe and Shelia P. Bledsoe was executed on April 14, 2016, for the consideration of \$2,300.00.

Laurens County – File 30.751 – Laurens Bypass – Third District

The Department acquired right of way for the Laurens Bypass under File 30.751 from Mary Jenkins Wilson by Title to Real Estate dated July 8, 1999.

On September 18, 2008, the South Carolina Department of Transportation Commission unanimously authorized the SCDOT to abandon the Laurens Bypass project and relinquish all property interest. As a result of this action, negotiations commenced with the adjacent landowners to convey these unnecessary parcels. Therefore, a quitclaim deed conveying approximately 2.5 acres to Andrew Colby and Nichole Colby was executed on April 14, 2016, for the consideration of \$7,500.00.

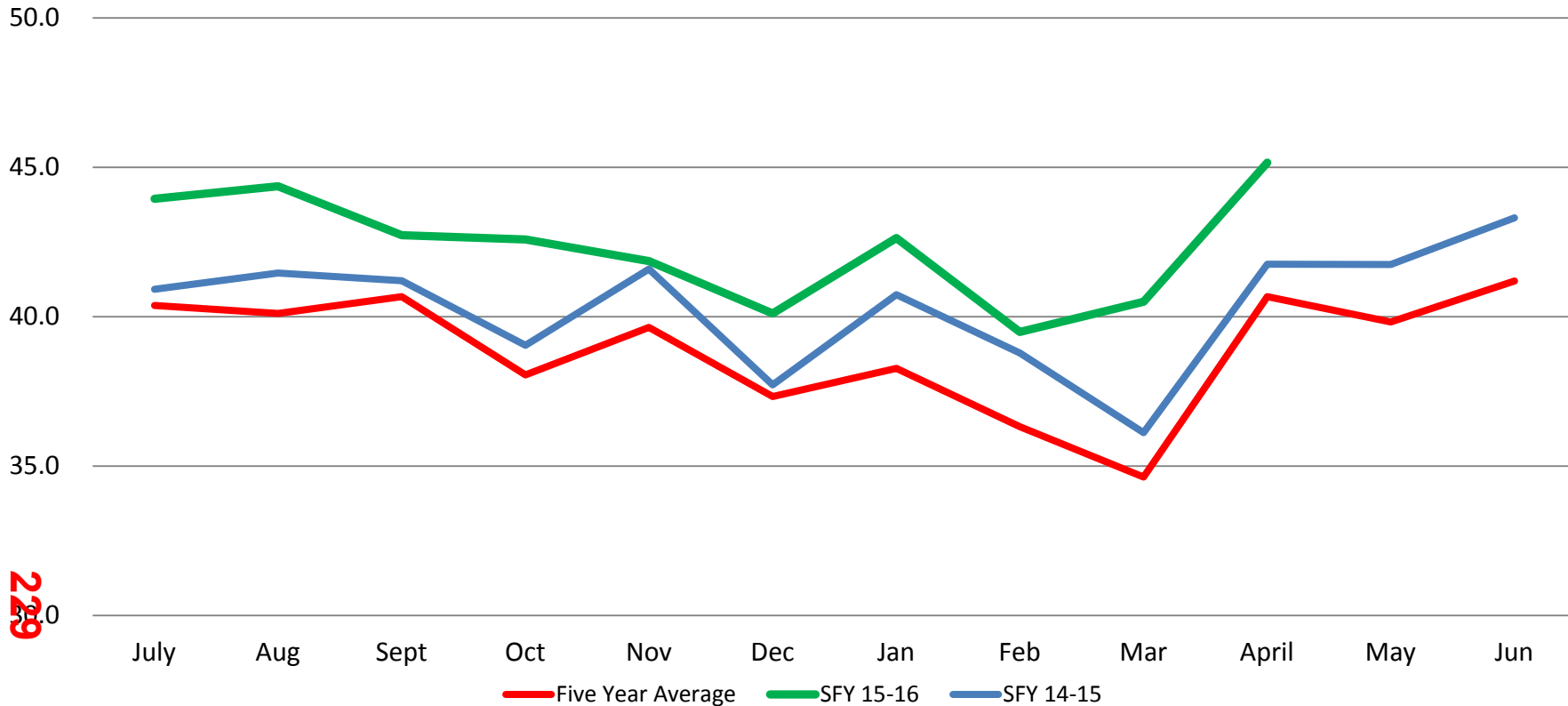

Comparison Of Monthly State Motor Fuel Revenues (in millions)

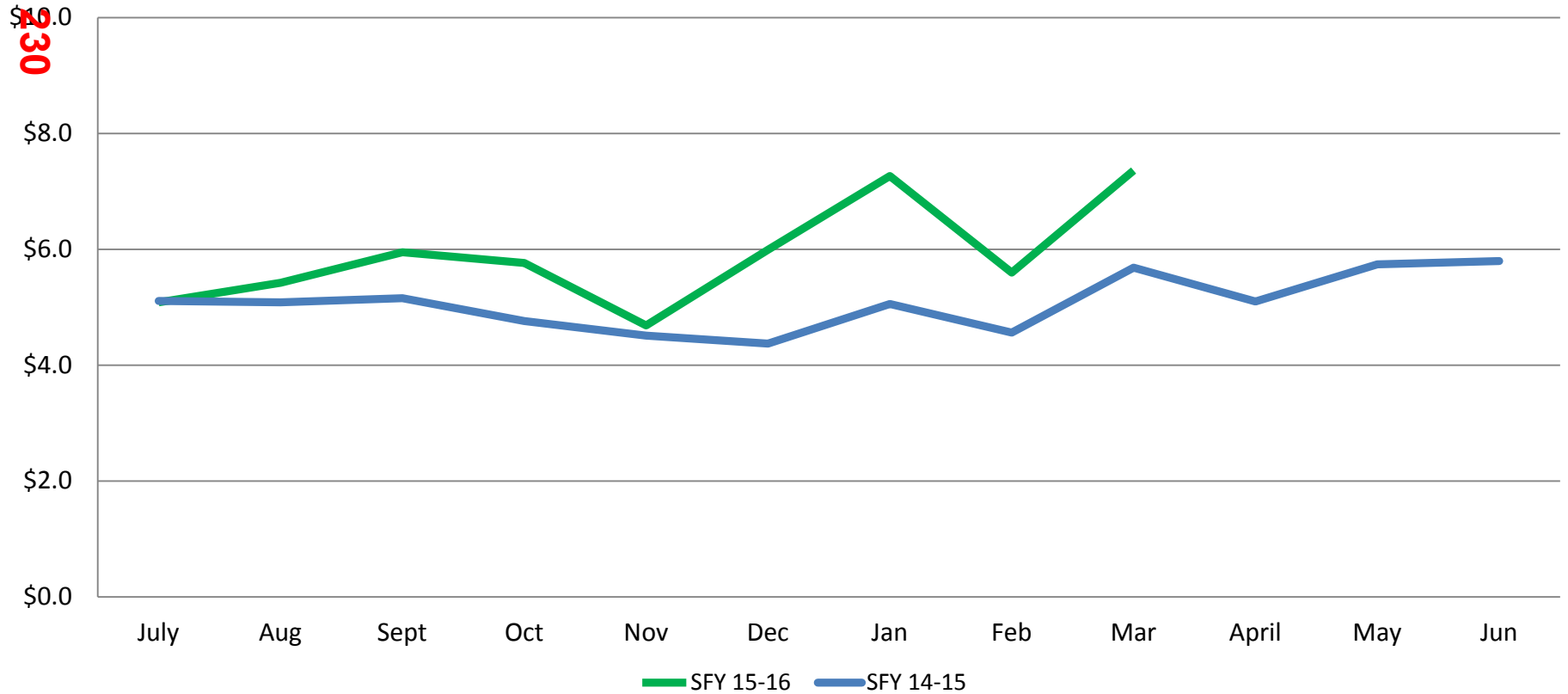

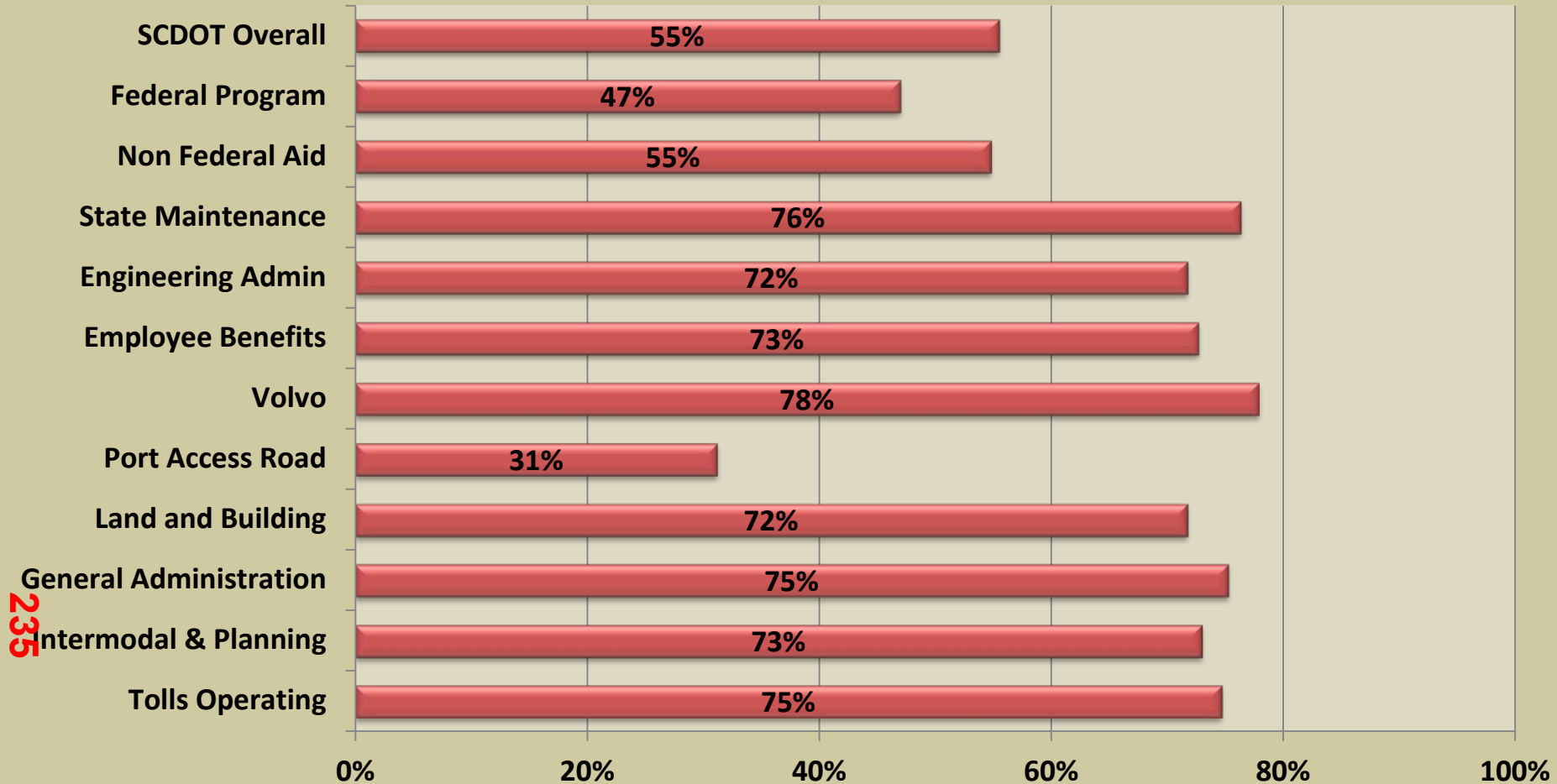
State Fiscal Year 2016 Revenues at March 31, 2016

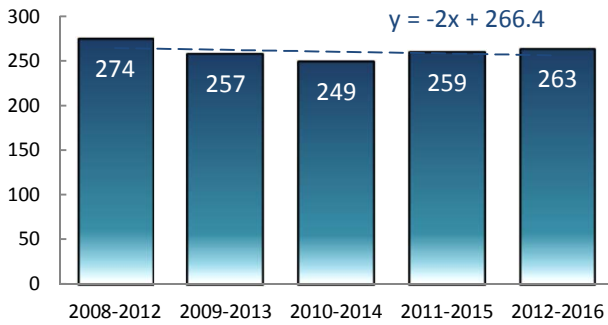

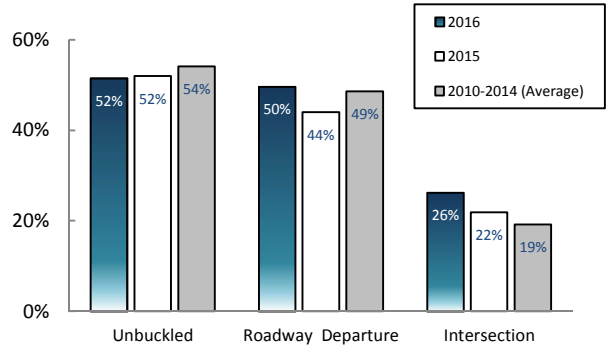

April Average Fatality Trends



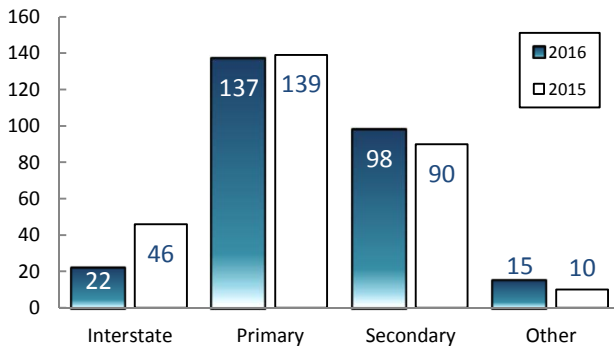

Fatalities by SHSP Emphasis Area



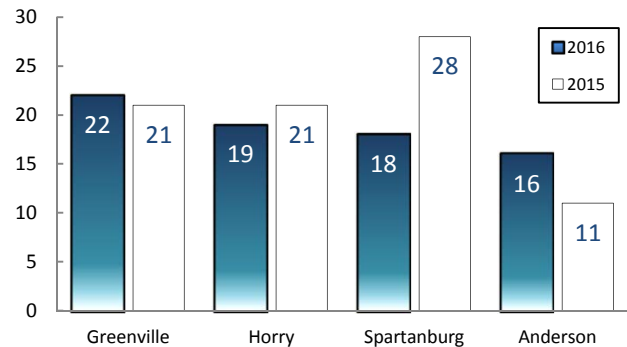

Fatalities by Route Category



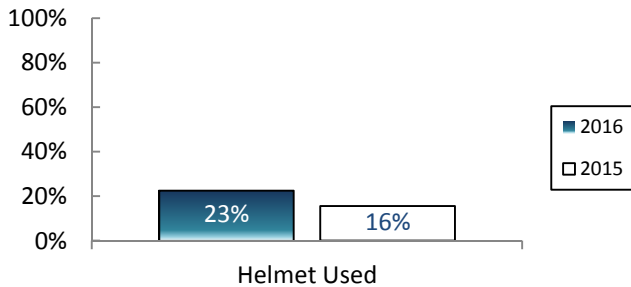

Top Fatality Counties



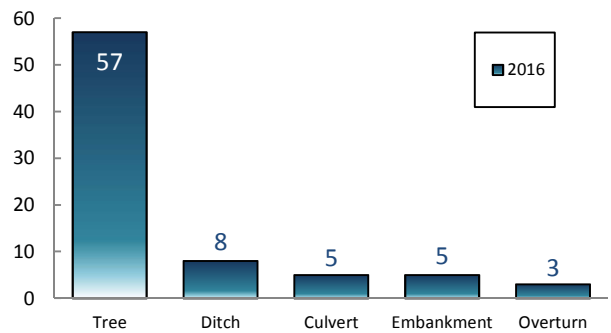

State Issues

We are monitoring 100 bills specific to SCDOT, in addition to 54 road naming bills, 38 of which have been adopted.

Bills that have Passed:

H.3579, the “roads bill,” has passed both the House and the Senate, albeit in different versions. The bill is now in a conference committee to hammer out the differences in governance and funding. The committee has met once, but has not done anything substantive yet.

S.1258, the “road funding bill,” was passed by the Senate and was taken up in Ways and Means this week. Ways and Means amended the bill to add provisions that largely reflect the reform components of the House version of H.3579. The Governor would appoint the Commission, and the Secretary would be appointed by the Commission, as well as some other changes. The bill would result in a total revenue increase to SCDOT of about \$200 million. SCDOT would have the ability to select projects and have the State Infrastructure Bank finance the projects with the revenue from this bill, with the remainder going to resurfacing.

The Senate passed their version of the budget last week. The Senate removed the \$135 million in nonrecurring revenue funding for SCDOT from the House budget, but retained the transfer of funds from DMV fines and fees (\$85 million) and the transfer of the remaining \$65 million balance of the auto sales tax to basically reflect **S.1258**. Other noteworthy differences are below:

- ◆ Sunset for Secretary’s appointment by Governor was suspended
- ◆ SCDOT must establish “pothole buster” teams in each District
- ◆ SCDOT, in conjunction with the Inspector General, must find and contract with a firm to do a structural efficiencies study of SCDOT

Additional bills we are monitoring that have moved or may move:

H.4932—Size and weight limits by Rep. Allison: the SC size and weight statute is out of compliance with federal law regarding a number of technical issues such as length of motorsport trailers, weight of auxiliary power units, and bus axle weights, and this bill would make the needed changes, which are fairly minor. The bill has passed the House and the Senate.

H.3685—Electronic ticketing by Rep. D. Moss: this bill fixes a Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration compliance issue that could cost SCDOT \$24-48 million in federal funds. States are required by federal law to notify other states of CDL violations within 10 days and SC is not in compliance. H.3685 has passed the House and the Senate.



State Issues

Additional bills we are monitoring that have moved or may move: (con't.)

S.561—Duties of the Commission by Sen. Grooms: this bill deletes various duties of the Commission such as approval of enhancement grants, curb cuts, signal installation, consulting contracts, contracts over \$500,000, sale of surplus property, etc. S.561 has passed the Senate.

S.315—DOT Secretary Appointment by Sen. Grooms: this resolution repeals the sunset provision for the Governor appointing the Secretary, and has passed the Senate.

S.1157—Relocation of Utility Lines by Sen. Cleary and Sen. Campbell: this bill would require SCDOT to pay for relocation of most water and sewer lines within the right of way. The bill died on the Senate floor.

S.165—Automatic Stay by Sen. Hembree: the bill would require posting of a bond before issuance of an injunction in the ALC by a party challenging a permit. S.165 is now on the Senate floor awaiting second reading.

S.199—Workzone Safety by Sen. Grooms: the bill increases penalties for speeding in a workzone. S.199 has been passed by both bodies, and is now on the Senate floor with House amendments.

H.4056—Disqualification of contractors by Rep. Funderburk: this bill disqualifies contractors that benefit a trust for a disqualified person or their family. H.4056 is on the Senate floor awaiting 3rd reading with an amendment.

SCDOT Public Transit Funding Program Summary

State Mass Transit Funds (SMTF)

- Sourced from 1/4 of one cent of the state motor fuel user fee (approximately \$6.0 million annually)
- SCDOT allocates funding to all public transit agencies by Commission-approved formula
- Assists in providing match for federal urban and rural formula programs, and allocated at the same ratio as federal formula allocations
- Funds may also be used for special projects or to support transit projects not otherwise eligible for federal funds

Section 5307 Large Urban Program

- Amount of funds for each TMA (Population > 200,000) set and provided directly to large urban transit agencies by FTA
- Eligible activities operations (with limits, and capped at 50% Federal), capital and planning (both capped at 80% Federal, except vehicles which are 85%)
- Entities responsible for local match in combination with limited State Mass Transit Funds
- SCDOT reviews & monitors the use of State Mass Transit funding

Section 5307 Small Urban Program

- Single statewide apportionment provided by FTA to state DOT's
- SCDOT serves as federally-defined Designated Recipient for small urbanized areas between 50,000 and 200,000
- SCDOT allocates funding to small urban transit agencies by Commission-approved formula mirroring FTA formula
- Eligible activities operations (capped at 50% Federal), capital and planning (both capped at 80% Federal, except vehicles which are 85%)
- Entities responsible for local match in combination with limited State Mass Transit Funds
- SCDOT allows small urban transit agencies to apply directly to FTA for federal funding
- SCDOT reviews & monitors the use of State Mass Transit funding

Section 5311 Rural Transit Program

- Single statewide apportionment provided by FTA to state DOT's
- SCDOT serves as federally-defined Designated Recipient for rural areas less than 50,000
- SCDOT allocates funding to rural transit agencies by Commission-approved formula
- Eligible activities operations (capped at 50% Federal), capital and planning (both capped at 80% Federal, except vehicles which are 85%)
- SCDOT can use up to 10% of the total funds for program administration, and is required to use up to 15% for intercity bus activities
- These funds are allocated to and administered by SCDOT.
- Entities responsible for local match in combination with limited State Mass Transit Funds
- Rural transit agencies contract directly with SCDOT as subrecipients for Federal and state funding
- SCDOT reviews & monitors the use of Federal and State Mass Transit funding, and FTA holds SCDOT accountable for compliance with Federal rules and regulations.

Section 5310 Enhanced Mobility of Seniors & Individuals with Disabilities Program

- FTA provides funding to large urbanized areas directly and to SCDOT as the Designated Recipient for small urbanized and rural areas to improve mobility for the elderly and persons with disabilities.
- Funding limited to capital purchases (typically vehicle acquisition) or a purchase of service contract.
- The Federal share is capped at 80% for purchase of service contracts or 85% for vehicle acquisitions.
- SCDOT allocates these funds based on applications from qualified human services agencies and other entities.
- If vehicles are purchased, SCDOT holds a lien on the title of the vehicle for its prescribed useful life.
- SCDOT encourages coordination and leveraging of multiple funding sources, and projects must be a part of a locally developed coordination plan.
- Councils of Governments act as Designated Coordinating Agencies and serve as first review of local applications.
- Local human service agencies contract directly with SCDOT as subrecipients for Federal funding.
- Local Agencies (subrecipients) are fully responsible for local match – no State Mass Transit Funds are used as match.
- SCDOT reviews & monitors the use of Federal and State Mass Transit Funding, and FTA holds SCDOT accountable for compliance with Federal rules and regulations.

Section 5339 Bus and Bus Facilities Program

- FTA provides funding to large urbanized areas directly and to SCDOT as the Designated Recipient for small urbanized and rural areas.
- Funding provided to eligible recipients for capital projects to replace, rehabilitate, and purchase buses and related equipment, and to construct/rehabilitate bus-related facilities.
- Support the continuation and expansion of public transportation services in the United States
- SCDOT ties allocation of funding apportioned to South Carolina to transit asset management vehicle utilization review and statewide vehicle needs assessment.
- The Federal share is capped at 85% for vehicle acquisitions and 80% for other capital needs.
- SCDOT utilizes Toll Revenue Credits as non-cash soft match.
- SCDOT reviews & monitors the use of Federal funding and state soft match, and FTA holds SCDOT accountable for compliance with Federal rules and regulations.

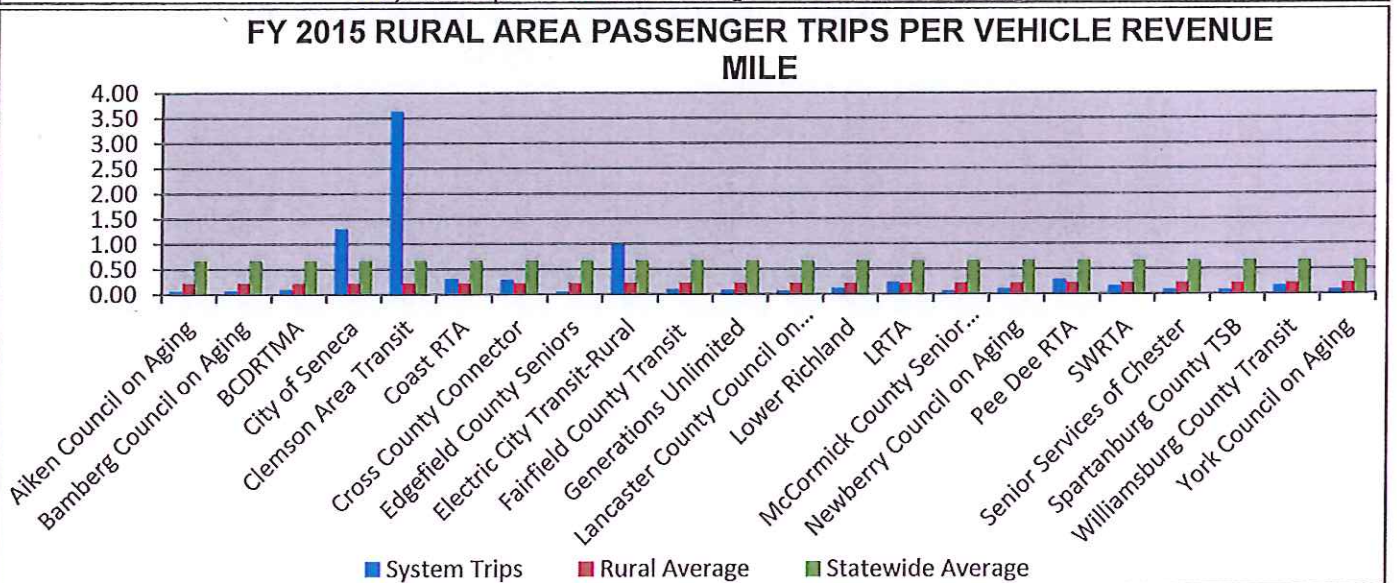
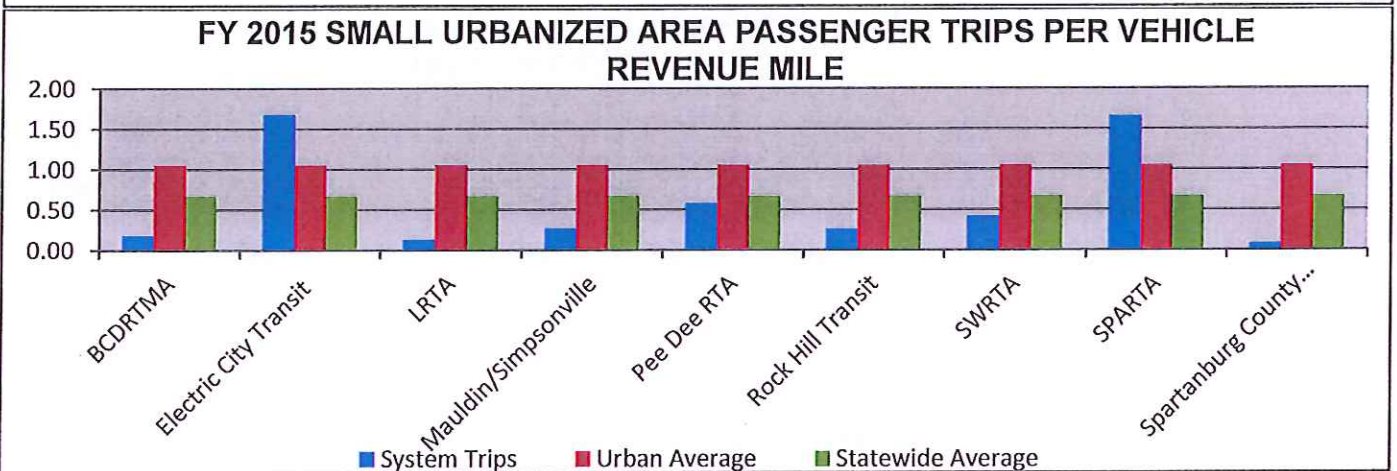
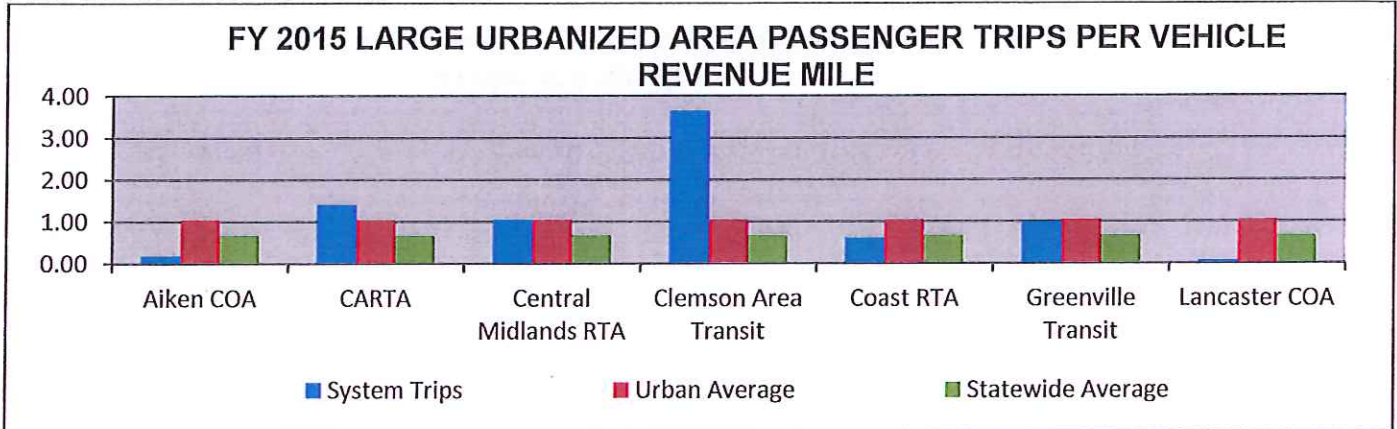

PASSENGER TRIPS PER VEHICLE REVENUE HOUR (STATEWIDE AVERAGES)

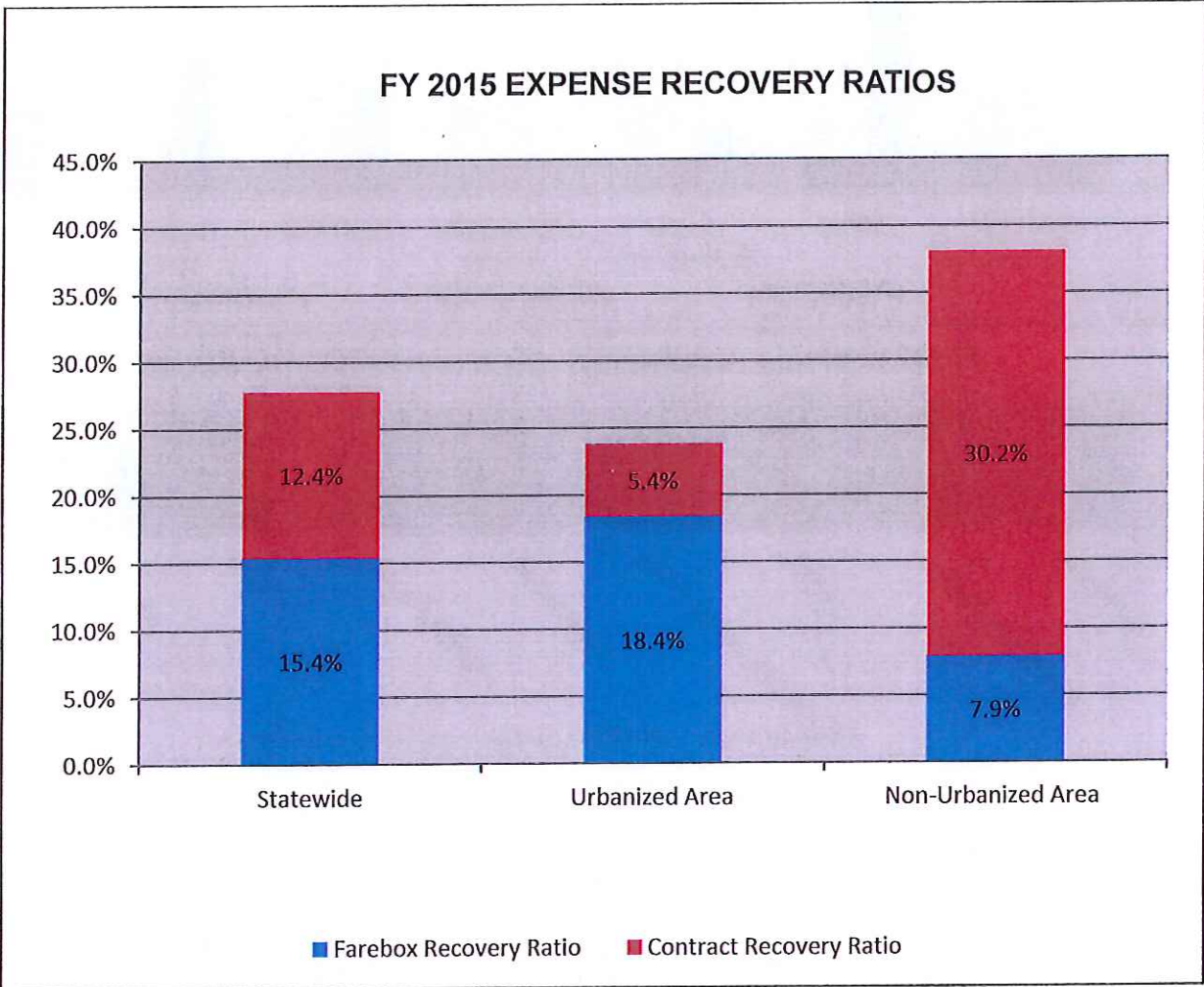

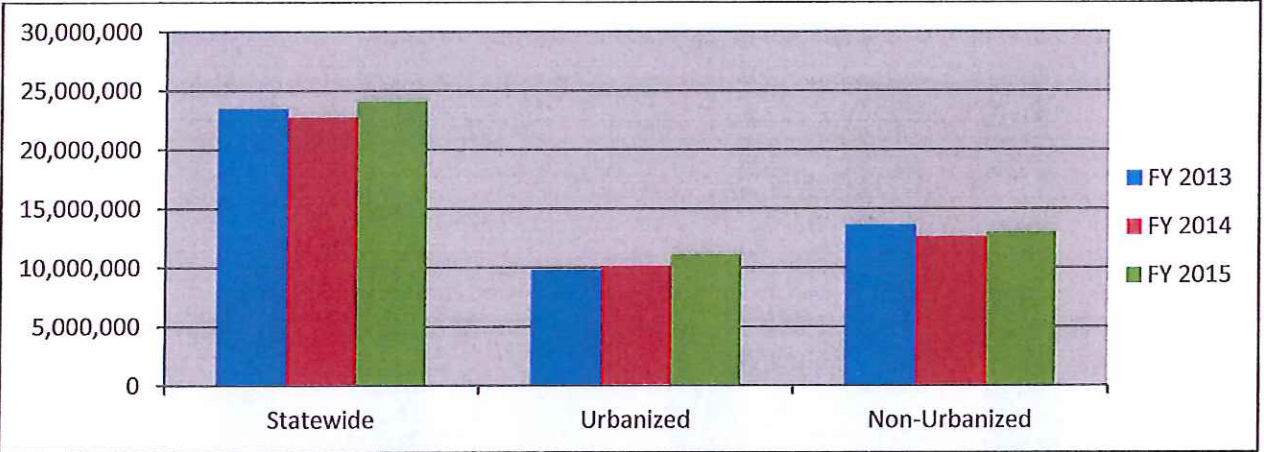
TOTAL PASSENGER TRIPS

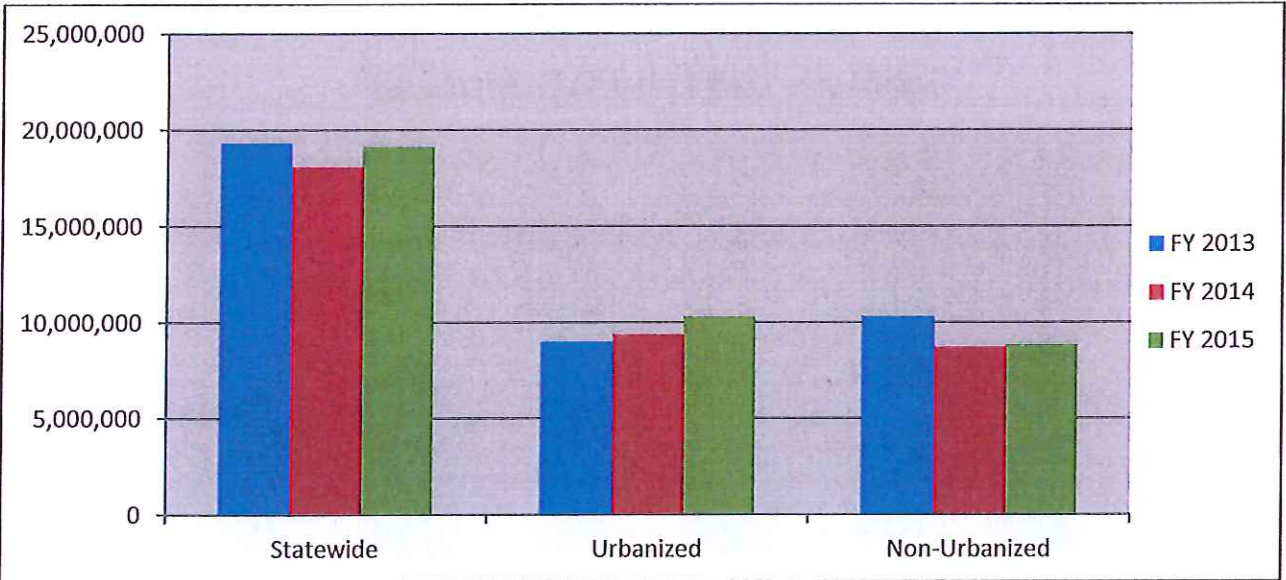

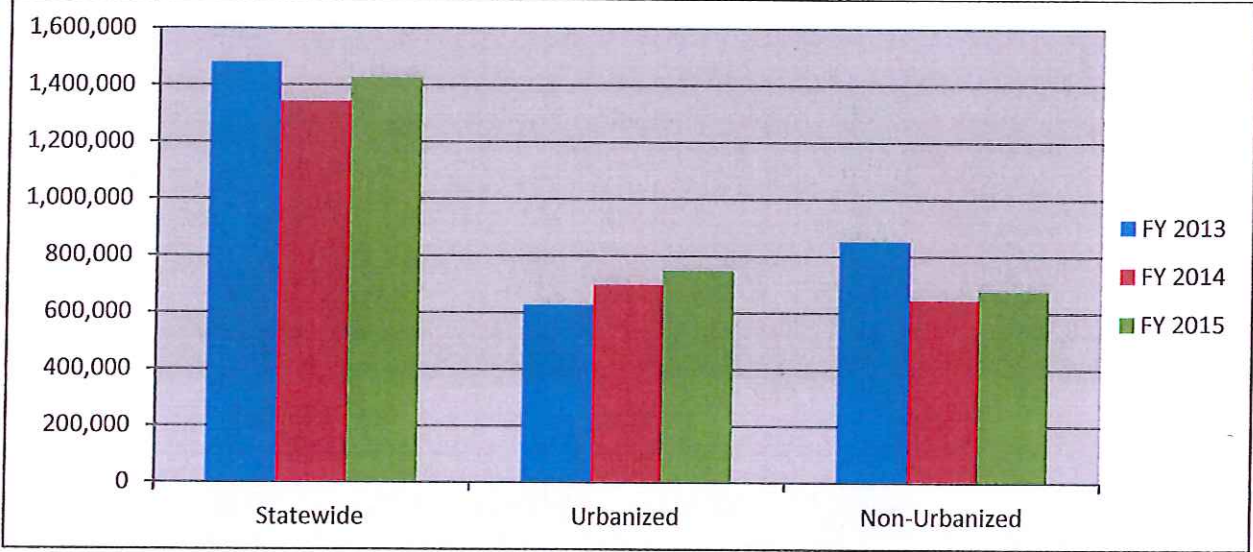
ANNUAL VEHICLE REVENUE MILES

News & Accomplishments

SCDOT Opens Toms Creek Bridge on Bluff Road in Richland County



SCDOT held a ribbon-cutting ceremony on the afternoon of Friday, April 22, 2016 on a newly completed Richland County bridge crossing Toms Creek on Bluff Road. The concrete culvert that had been in place at that location was destroyed beyond repair in the October 2015 flood. The replacement was a 100-foot, flat slab bridge structure. The total cost for this project was just over \$1.5 million. Members of the Gadsden and Eastover Communities turned out to hear comments from SCDOT Commissioner Glover, Eastover Mayor Geraldene Robinson, Rep. Jimmy C. Bales, Rep. Joe Neal, Senator Darrell Jackson, SC FHWA Administrator Emily Lawton and SCDOT Secretary Chris-

ty Hall.

SHEP Celebrates 20 Years of Service

SCDOT held a celebration event on Monday, April 25, 2016 to mark the 20th anniversary of the agency's State Highway Emergency Program, or "SHEP" as it's commonly known. Following the program's launch in 1996, SHEP Responders now serve motorists traveling in the Charleston, Columbia, Florence, Grand Strand/Myrtle Beach and Upstate (Cherokee, Spartanburg, Greenville and Anderson areas.) SHEP Responders are prepared to make minor repairs to disabled vehicles, assist with traffic control and traffic incident management.



SCDOT Honors Fallen Workers on Workers' Memorial Day

A concurrent resolution passed by the SC General Assembly declared April 28, 2016, as "Workers' Memorial Day" in tribute to the working men and women who have lost their lives because of workplace injuries and illnesses. SCDOT honored 34 employees who have lost their lives on the job. In addition, three employees who died serving SCDOT and the state in just the past year were highlighted.

- Timothy Gibson heroically lost his life while working the 1,000 year flood in October 2015. Gibson worked for Richland Maintenance and was working in the Gill's Creek area of Garner's Ferry Road on October 4th when his SCDOT truck was swept away by rushing waters.
- Henry Clay "Ray" Norris Jr., a highway maintenance work in Darlington County died on October 20, 2015. He was struck by a truck while working on a Darlington County road.
- Paul Fee, a Richland Maintenance highway worker was killed in February of 2015. Fee and his crew were engaged in pothole patching operations in a temporary work zone on Farrow Road in Columbia when a pickup truck drove into the work zone, striking him.



The ceremony was held on the front steps of SCDOT's Headquarters building. A large crowd of employees, members of the media, the public and members of the Gibson, Norris and Fee families gathered to hear comments from Secretary Hall, SCDOT Commission Chairman Mike Wooten, FHWA SC Administrator Emily Lawton, SCDOT Director of Occupational Safety & Health Kenny Eargle and Andy Leaphart, SCDOT Chief Engineer for Operations.

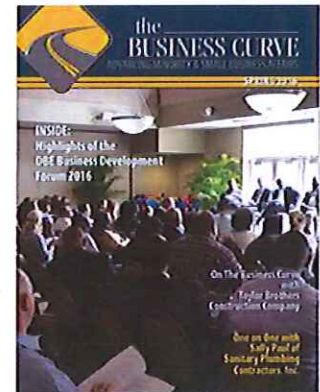

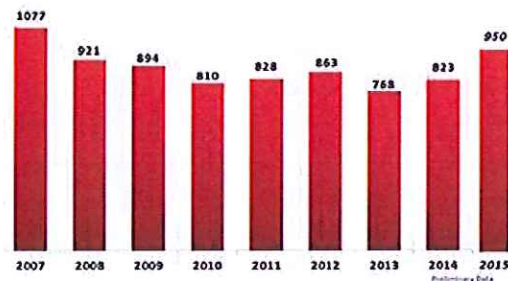
SCDOT Minority & Small Business Affairs Office Launches New Publication

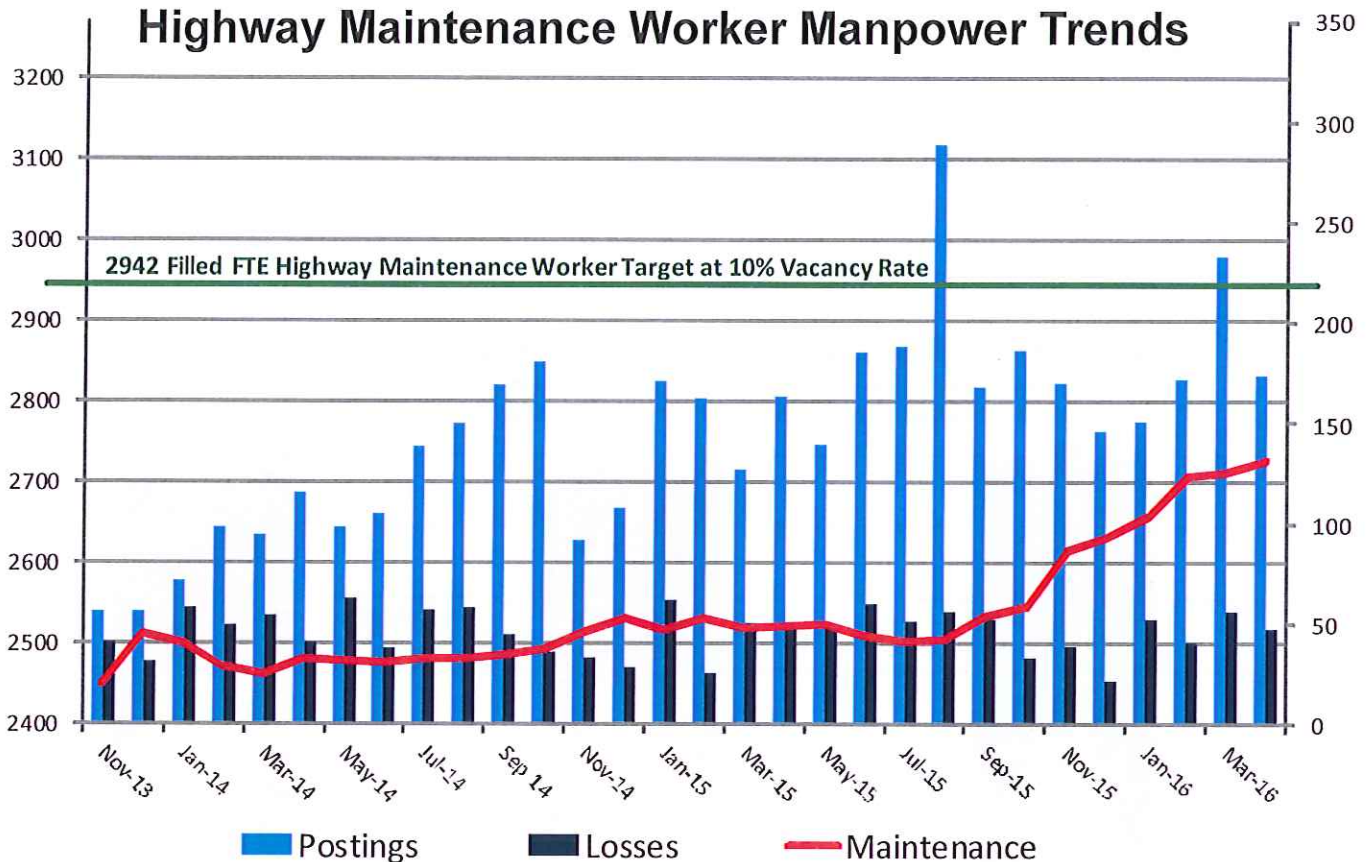

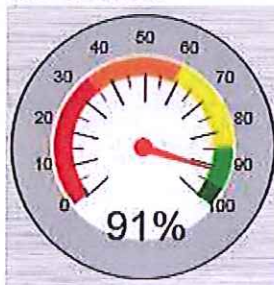


Maintenance Work Request Response

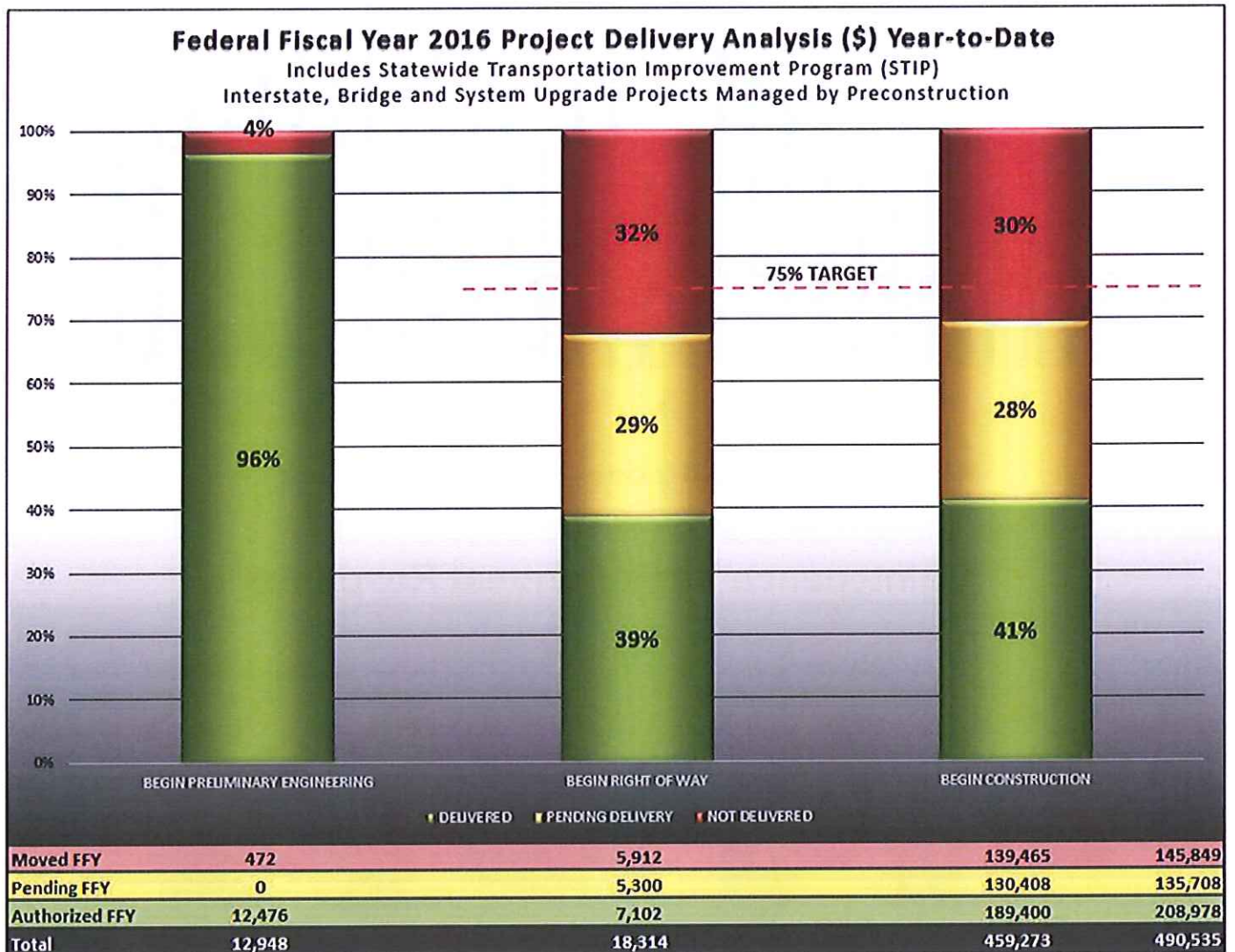


Improve Project Delivery

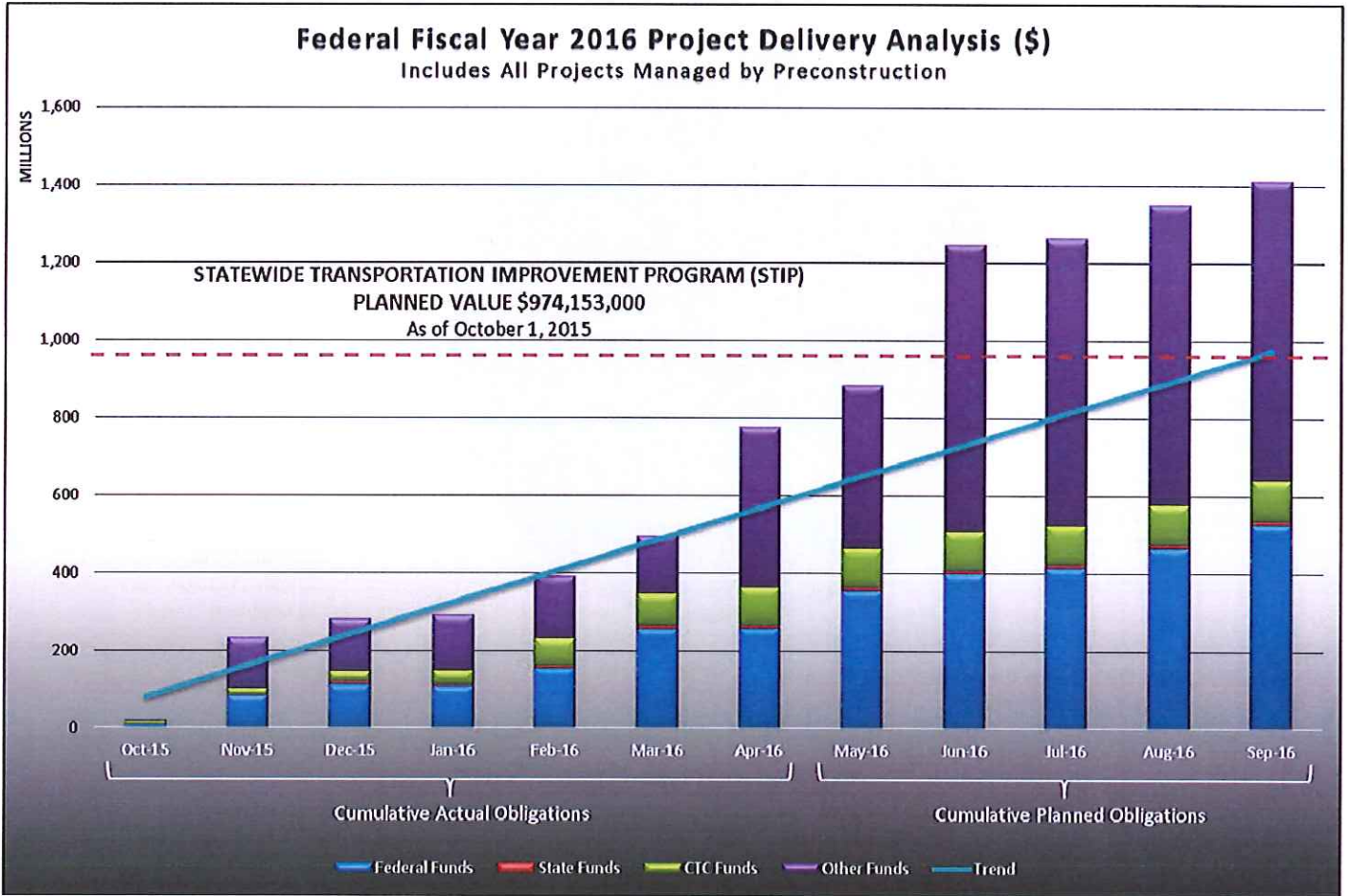
Delivering projects on-time and on-budget are the expectations of our stakeholders. Delayed projects introduce additional costs in escalating material costs and higher user costs due to uncorrected deficiencies in the performance or condition of the state highway system.

SCDOT is currently developing 560 projects in the pre-construction pipeline at an estimated value of \$2.65 Billion.

SCDOT currently is managing the construction phase of 385 highway & bridge projects at a value approaching \$2.3 Billion which includes \$1.75 Billion in contracts for SCDOT plus \$504 Million in Local Sales Tax Program projects. These projects are a mix of resurfacing, widening, new location and other road & bridge activities.



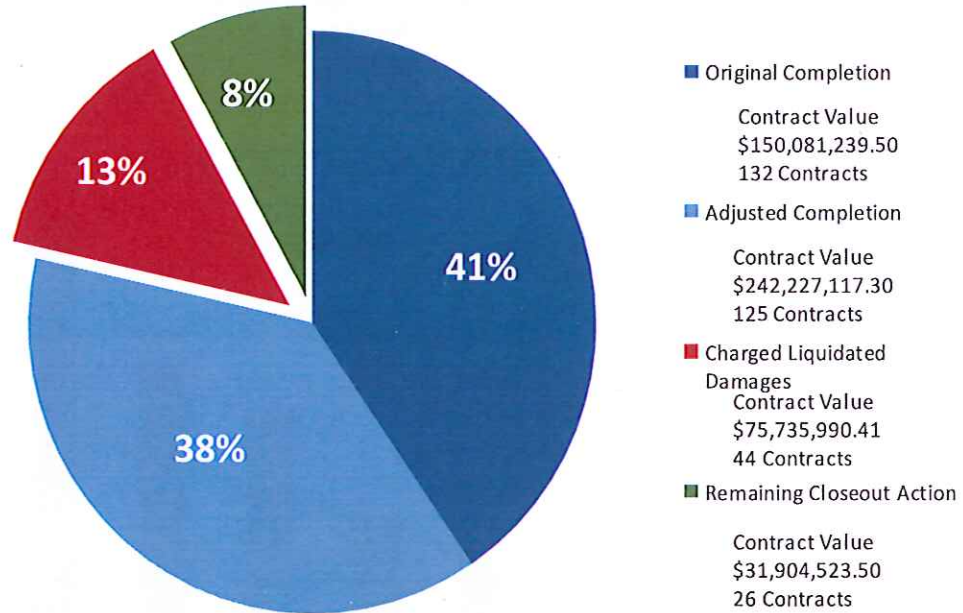

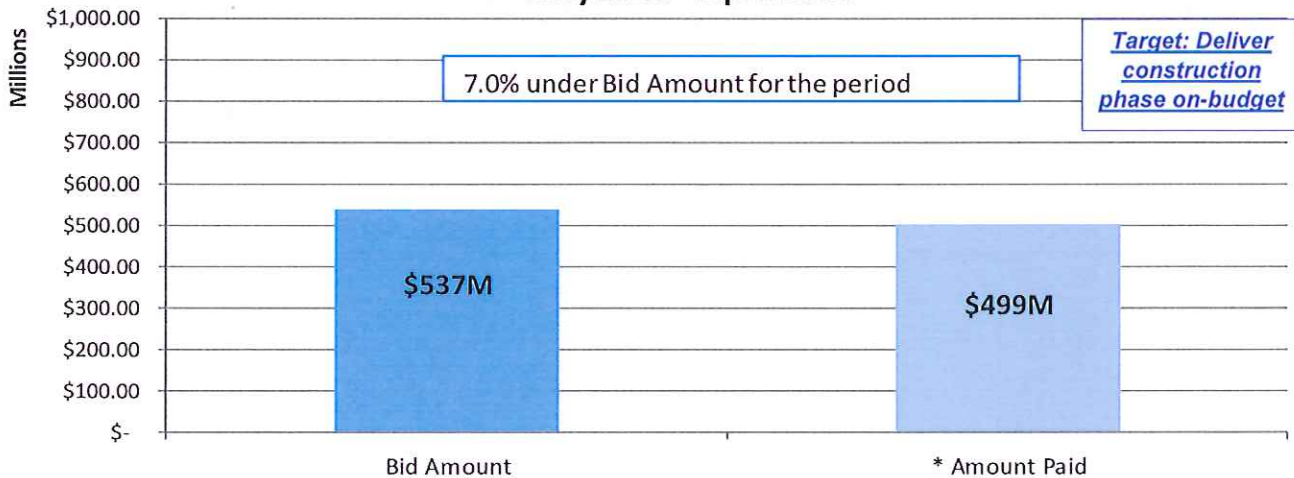

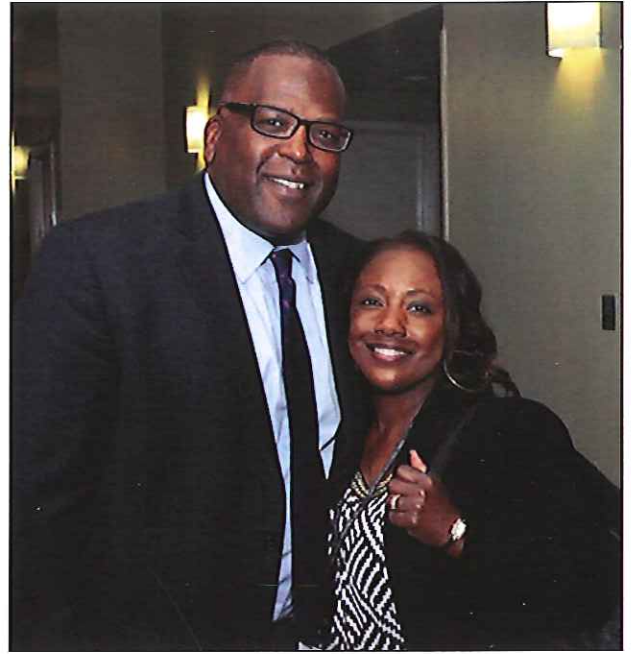
Roneka Matheny, Managing Director of Bob's Landscape & Ir-

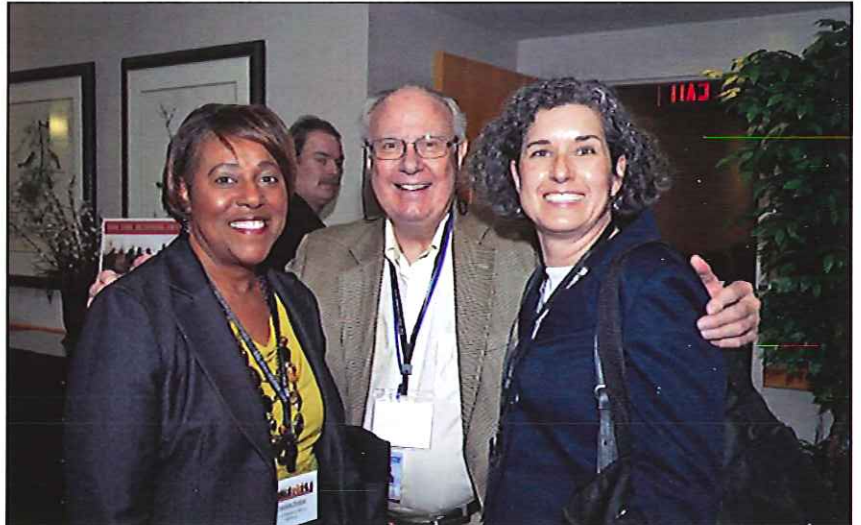

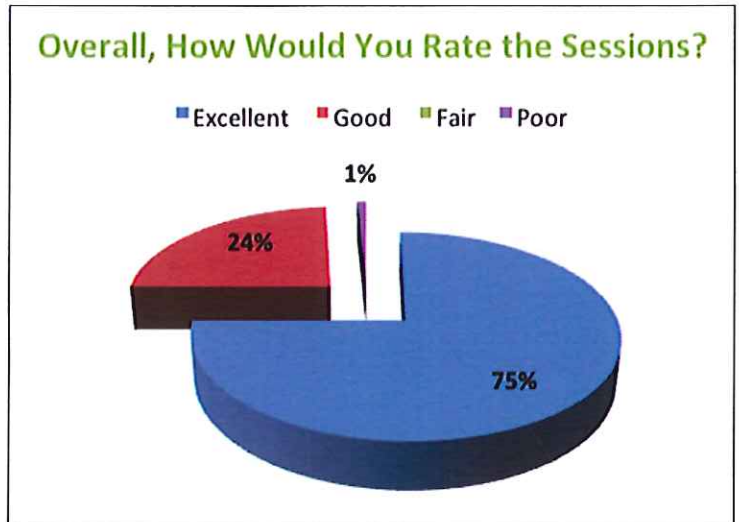

On The Business Curve with Taylor Brothers Construction Company

When SCDOT started certifying firms for the Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE), Taylor Brothers Construction Company was among the first group of businesses to be certified as a DBE. Taylor Brothers Construction Company has been around for three generations. The company started out with the current owners' grandfather (Samuel T. "Papa" Taylor) digging basements for residencies. Later Papa Taylor's two sons, Robert and Samuel Taylor, joined and expanded their father's business by branching out into hauling construction materials for local contractors. Together the brothers started growing their business to include commercial excavation in Columbia's business district. Main Street for instance, has a few buildings that were excavated by the Taylors Brothers Construction Company. First Citizens Bank, Jefferson Square Theatre and more recently the Darla Moore School of Business are three such examples of their work.

In 1984, the Taylor Brothers Construction Company was certified as a trucking company. They started out with one truck and with the increased work from SCDOT they were able to move to twenty trucks. Not long after certification, the Taylor Brothers Construction Company branched out into other areas to include building, grading and 'Farm to Market' road projects. Co-owner, Ronald Taylor, reflected back to when his company did the 'Farm to Market' road projects, stating that at the time the government used the Penny Tax to build-up dirt roads to paved roads and to date, most of these roads are still in very good condition.

Mr. Taylor added that being a part of SCDOT as a DBE has been beneficial and a vital part of developing their company. It has greatly increased their building capacity and has helped their company cultivate the ingenuity and resourcefulness that is required for a state job in terms of handling the bidding process, scheduling and close-out.

When asked, some of his company's greatest accomplishments have been as a DBE, Mr. Ronald Taylor responded by saying "bringing people with us. That is, taking pride in helping other minority businesses and doing the work in the spirit of the program." Mr. Taylor's advice to other businesses that would like to be certified as a DBE is, "do not let fear stand in the way of doing business with SCDOT."

Affirmative Action Officer

The newly designed position of Affirmative Action Officer was recently added to the Division of Minority and Small Business Affairs (MSBA) portfolio. Syrees Gillens Oliver was given the mandate to carry out the duties and responsibilities using the most dynamic and innovative ways possible.



According to Ms. Oliver, as the Affirmative Action Officer for the South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) she has been given the task of increasing the minority and women workforce with suitably qualified candidates by coordinating and implementing the agency's efforts to develop, meet and exceed affirmative action goals. In essence, giving qualified dis-

advantaged individuals the opportunity that they would not otherwise have to be a part of SCDOT's workforce.

Ms. Oliver's long-term goal is to attain an overall percentage of one hundred to reach the agency's affirmative action program. She plans to accomplish this goal through educating and training while employing the best recruitment practices. Currently, she has been coordinating some of her efforts with historically black colleges and universities, SC Department of Social Services, SC Vocational Rehabilitation Services, SC Human Affairs Commission, New America Corporation, Midlands Fatherhood Coalition (located in 5 counties), church organizations, the SPICE (Self-Paced In-Class Education) Program, and media publications that cater to predominantly minority communities.

Her short-term goal is to increase the minority and women workforce by ten percent within the next three years; while also implementing mandatory training for all SCDOT supervisors and managers which will promote diversity and inclusion.

Title VI

It is the policy of South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) to assure affirmative compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, and in accordance with all other related statutes, regulations and Executive Orders. The assurances previously given by the Federal Highway Administration are hereby reaffirmed and extend to the Federal Transit Administration. Examples of the application of this policy include, but are not limited to, the following:

No person on the grounds of race, color, national origin, sex, age, or disability will be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefit of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity for which SCDOT receives federal financial assistance from the U. S. Department of Transportation, including the Federal Highway Administration and the Federal Transit Administration. In addition, SCDOT will not retaliate against any person who complains of discrimination or who participates in an investigation of discrimination.

Mentor-Protégé Program

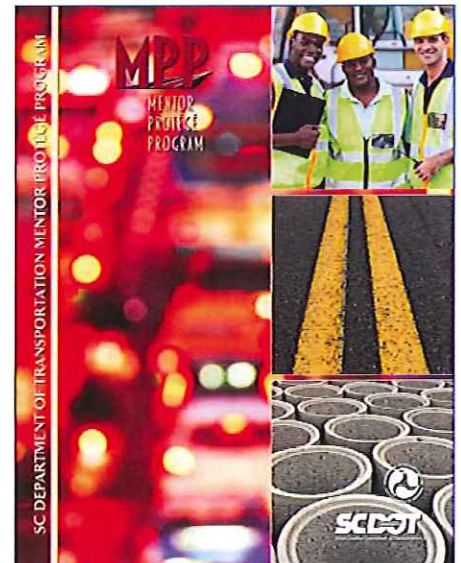
On September 3, 2015 the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) signed into approval the South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) new Mentor-Protégé program (MPP). The previous pilot program was enacted in 2009 and had been dormant for a substantial period of time. The SCDOT Division of Minority & Small Business Affairs (MSBA) is extremely excited about this new program and is actively seeking partnerships to be a part of the dynamic undertaking that will allow well established contractors the opportunity to Mentor and develop SCDOTs up and coming Disadvantaged Business Enterprises who are prepared to take the next step towards success.

The purpose of the Mentor-Protégé Program (MPP) is to establish a link between businesses certified under the South Carolina Unified Certification Program (UCP), successful professional service providers, and general contractors who contract with SCDOT on highway design or engineering and construction projects. The program is sponsored by SCDOT in coordination with the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and is designed to build a more effective, competitive and diverse pool of contractors capable of bidding on future projects.

FHWA has been instrumental in the development of the new

program as well as key leaders from SCDOT. Together we have collectively taken the pieces of the pilot program that were a success and added them into the new program. The MSBA also spent several months interviewing contractors who had been a part of the pilot program as well as other Mentor Protégé programs to find out what worked well and what did not. It was a long and tireless process but we believe that we have come up with a program that will provide our DBEs a tremendous opportunity to grow and expand in doing work with SCDOT.

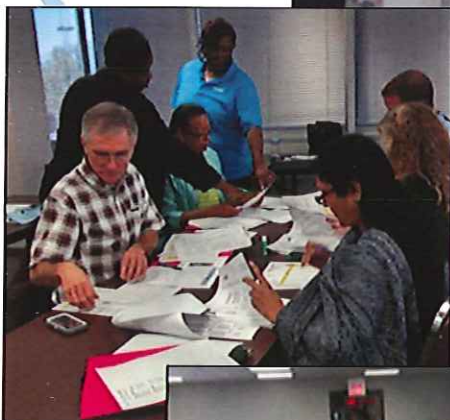

The Code of Federal Regulations, 49 CFR 26.55 - How is DBE participation counted toward goals governs DBERDM participation tracking requirements on projects. The DBE Quarterly Report form is used to track payments to DBEs for work performed on all projects. Other forms such as the Subcontractor Hauler Approval Request form and the DBE Tracking Spreadsheet are also vital for reconciling DBE payments.

To comply with these regulations and ensure DBE project tracking is accurate, training has begun for internal customers and training for external customers is expected to begin December 2016. Training includes onsite visits and workshops statewide.

Port Access Roadway

The Division of Minority and Small Business Affairs (MSBA) hosted a "Port Access Roadway" Design Build Project DBE Outreach event in North Charleston, South Carolina, on February 9, 2016. This event allowed SCDOT certified DBEs in the Construction industry an opportunity to meet with the Prime contractors that have been short-listed to bid on this project. The teams of Traylor Brothers, Inc. & United Infrastructure Group, Inc.; Fluor Enterprises, Inc. & Lane Construction Corporation; and Skanska USA Civil Southeast, Inc. & PCL Civil Constructors, Inc. were on hand to meet and speak with DBE firms in attendance. In addition to these firms, James (Jim) K. Van Ness, III, P.E., Director, Engineering, Facilities Maintenance, and Environmental, with the South Carolina Ports Authority, along with James (Jae) H. Mattox, III, P.E., SCDOT Design Build, participated in the program.

The Port Access Road is a new roadway and structure project to provide direct access between the proposed marine container terminal location on the former Navy Base and I-26 while maintaining adequate service for local, commuter, and commercial traffic. Included in the Project's purpose is the intent to safely integrate

container terminal traffic with existing traffic; support local and regional planning policies and strategies; and minimizing adverse impacts on communities and the environment. The Project consists of the construction of a new fully directional interchange on I-26, a Bainbridge Connector Road, the extension of Stromboli Avenue and associated roadway improvements to surface streets to serve the proposed Naval Base Terminal (NBT) in Charleston County, South Carolina.

One on One with Sally Paul of Sanitary Plumbing Contractors, Inc.



Recently, the Division of Minority and Small Business Affairs (MSBA) had a one on one interview with Sally Paul of Sanitary Plumbing Contractors Inc. MSBA wanted to find out how it has been for her company since being certified as a DBE and what advice, if any, she has for other DBEs and non-DBEs. Sanitary Plumbing Contracting specializes in construction, roadwork and grading. See questions and responses below.

How long have you been in business?

The business was originally owned by my father. I started out working in the healthcare industry but hated it. My dad had an opening in the 1970s, and I decided to work with him in the business. I liked it instantly. However, soon after I started, my father experienced a decline in business and eventually went bankrupt. It was just the two of us left in the business and it was clear to me what had to be done. I started exploring subcontracting. I guess just watching my dad and mom going through the blue prints on the dining table every night when I was younger led me to believe it was in my blood to carry on the business and I did.

How long have you been certified as a DBE or SBE?

We have been certified since 1986.

Why did you choose the DBE program?

I did not choose the program, it chose me. The one question I would be asked repeatedly being a subcontractor was; are you certified? So in a sense I was constantly being pulled to the DBE program. I always say being certified as a DBE cracked opened the door for me. It gives one the opportunity to do better. The help given by SCDOT cannot be quantified. It provides you with training and the necessary information for doing business with SCDOT.

What is your greatest accomplishment being a part of the DBE Program at SCDOT?

My greatest value so far is being able to help other certified DBEs. At the 2016 DBE Forum, for example, I was able to assist another DBE firm that is in the trucking business and that gives me much pleasure.

How has SCDOT helped your business grow?

SCDOT has provided me with lots of opportunities. They are just good customers. You know what is expected of you and they are very transparent.

What are some of your biggest contracts since being certified as a DBE?

“One of our largest and was one of our more challenging was the Mechanically Stabilizing Earth (MSE) walls that were built for the town of Mount Pleasant on Johnnie Dodds Blvd. It is one of the projects that I am most proud of.”

What would you say to other businesses that would like to be certified?

If you qualify to participate, then you should get certified because of the support and opportunities SCDOT provides.




SECTION 5: Appointment of Secretary of Transportation
